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Esquering Prepares Plans For Northern Fire Hall

Esquering Council is serious about starting its own fire brigade to serve the northeast corner of the township.

Councillors are upset over new financial arrangements to have the Georgetown brigade cover the sector surrounding Georgetown, which the Esquering councillors describe as 'over three times as high as last year and containing a clause which would allow the town to 'opt out' of the agreement on three months notice.

At Monday's meeting of the township council, architect Ray Shupe of Nobleton was interviewed and given authorization to prepare sketches of a new township fire hall. It would be erected on the south portion of the township's five acre municipal administration site on the Seventh Line.

Ideas expressed at Monday's meeting indicate the township wants a hall about 38 by 64 ft. with a double bay to hold two fire trucks, and an attached

Discuss Improvement Plans for St. John's Stewarttown Cemetery

There has been a great deal of local interest shown in the old St. John's Cemetery, recently and perhaps a brief outline of the history of this cemetery might be of interest to our readers.

The land was donated to the congregation of St. John's by an early pioneer family in the 1820's and the original plan was to build their church on that hill, but because the situation proved unsuitable for the building of their church, St. John's congregation made the property available to the community as a place of burial. This was a service to the community on the part of the congregation and at no time was there any charge made for sale of graves or plots.

Each family of the community had the responsibility of caring for their own family plot.

There are a number of graves of people who were wards of the local government, residents of the Old People's Home, or the "Poor House" as it was then called, located in the village, just below the cemetery.

With these facts in mind, a committee has been formed composed of interested residents of Stewarttown and district and with the co-operation of the Esquering Council improvements have been undertaken and a memorial service will be held on Sunday September 10th at 4:00 p.m. on the cemetery grounds, at which time future plans for the care and upkeep of this historic site will be discussed. The gravesites in this old cemetery date back to the early 1830's and possibly even earlier.
