## Taxation Committee Report Favours Plunkett Studies

Regional government proposals for the Halton-Peel area got surprise support from a powerful source Thursday, the Ontario committee on taxation.

The report issued Thursday morning by the committee headed by Lancelot J. Smith came out flatfooted, in favour of new systems of regional government in Ontario to replace existing counties and districts.

"This is the word municipal experts around here have been waiting for before pushing ahead full steam on regional government," said one Municipal Affairs department spokesman.

**Two Counties**  
He indicated that one of the first regional government setups that will be carried out will involve the Halton and Peel region.

The blueprint for regional government in Halton-Peel was drawn by municipal planning expert Thomas J. Plunkett of Montreal. After nearly a year of study and hearing briefs, Plunkett completed and published his controversial Halton-Peel regional government report last September.

The report proposed a new municipal structure of two regions, based on the development pattern of each area — urbanization in the south and rural in the north.

It advocated the creation of a rural Peel-Halton area in the north, covering an area of 510 square miles and would include Georgetown, Milton, Chinguacousy, Toronto Gore, Esquesing and Naasagaweya Townships, Acton, Bolton, Albion, Caledon and Caledon East.

The urban southern area planned would take in Burlington, Oakville, Port Credit, Streetsville, Brampton and part of Chinguacousy Township and all of Toronto Township.

Reaction to Plunkett's report came fast and thick — most of it in the form of criticism.

**North Area**  
Strongest opposition came from the northern areas, Milton, Acton, and Georgetown, in particular.

**School Bell, Motor Missing In Esquesing**  
During the week of August 27 to September 2, 1967 inclusive, personnel of Halton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 784 1/2 hours and patrolled 7,098 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol 34 charges were preferred, 49 traffic warnings issued and 77 vehicles were safety checked. There were 101 convictions registered in Magistrate's Court.

There were 5 property damage accidents investigated as well as 3 personal injury accidents, resulting in 5 persons being injured. Total property damage as a result of these accidents was approximately \$3,880. Causes of accidents were losing control of vehicle (3), following too close, inattentive driving (3) and a blow out. There were 4 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

There were 27 general occurrences during this period, including the theft of a school bell valued at approximately \$100., and an electric motor valued at \$105., 4 liquor investigations resulting in 6 charges being laid under the Liquor Control Act, 1 stolen bicycle was recovered for Georgetown P. D. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

## How to Help Avoid Mounting Car Thefts

Georgetown Police Department Inspector Harley Lowe has asked the Herald's co-operation in urging motorists to help curb the rising number of auto thefts.

The increase is general throughout Canada and the United States.

Inspector Lowe suggests drivers:

- Avoid isolated, unlighted areas when they park.
- Demand parking ticket stubs at lots and parking garages.
- Avoid parking on the street at night whenever possible.
- Always remove ignition key when leaving the car.
- Lock all valuables in the car trunk.
- Make sure all windows are secure.
- Lock all doors.
- Volunteer information to authorities regarding suspicious actions of people and vehicles around cars at odd hours.

Inspector Lowe said that nearly 90 per cent of stolen cars are recovered by the police soon after a theft — usually in worse condition. The average damage to a stolen car is more than \$200.

The total bill, of course is passed on to the public through higher insurance rates. But the indirect costs are even more serious. Stolen cars are often involved in other crimes and accidents.

One of the most shocking aspects of the problem is age of most car thieves. More than half of them are under 18 years old.

Though manufacturers are working on plans to fail the car thief, car owners keep on helping him. Of the stolen cars reported, 80 per cent were un-locked and 40 per cent had keys left in the ignition.
