They appointed Ted Evans, Prince Charles Drive, to the Planning Board to fill the unexpired term of Geoff Blich.

Council also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Betty-Sue Phee from the front office.

Without comment council gave third reading to a by-law to rezoned land on Water St. for an apartment site.

## Council Votes 5-3 for County Assessing System

Council endorsed the county assessment system by a vote of five to three at Monday night's council meeting. In so doing they instructed the reeve and deputy reeve to vote in favour of the proposal at this coming Friday's Council meeting.

Both the Reeve and deputy reeve agreed to be bound by a majority vote of council, in which they as members participated.

The mayor challenged their right to vote on the question in committee, saying they "voted in committee to tell themselves how to vote." He angrily denounced the county system claiming it deprived the citizens of the right of contact. "This is going to be an issue

constantly kept before the public," he announced.

"You said be good little boys and keep our mouths shut," retorted the deputy-reeve, "I say we have as much right to vote as anyone, we're just as entitled to our opinions as you are to yours," he concluded.

In answer to some of the mayor's charges that everything would be controlled from the south of the county, Reeve William Hunter stated the head office would be in Milton, and reminded council that the town would soon be on a free phone call hook-up with Milton. "A ratepayer will only have to lift the phone, to talk to the assessor." In conclusion he said he would vote on the motion right now as he felt he should, but

at County Council he would vote as the majority of his own council decided.

Cr. Smith backed the new proposal, claiming that the whole county together could afford computers to do a faster, more efficient job, but the town alone never could.

Cr. Roy Ballentine told council this system was working very well in Peel, with much better supervision in the rural areas. "How many people come down to the assessor's office anyway, except salesmen wanting to know which property has changed hands?"

The motion was carried five to three with Crs. Francis Young and Mayor Gibbons opposed.
