

LITTLE LEAGUE FINALS SEE CHICAGO CHAMPIONS

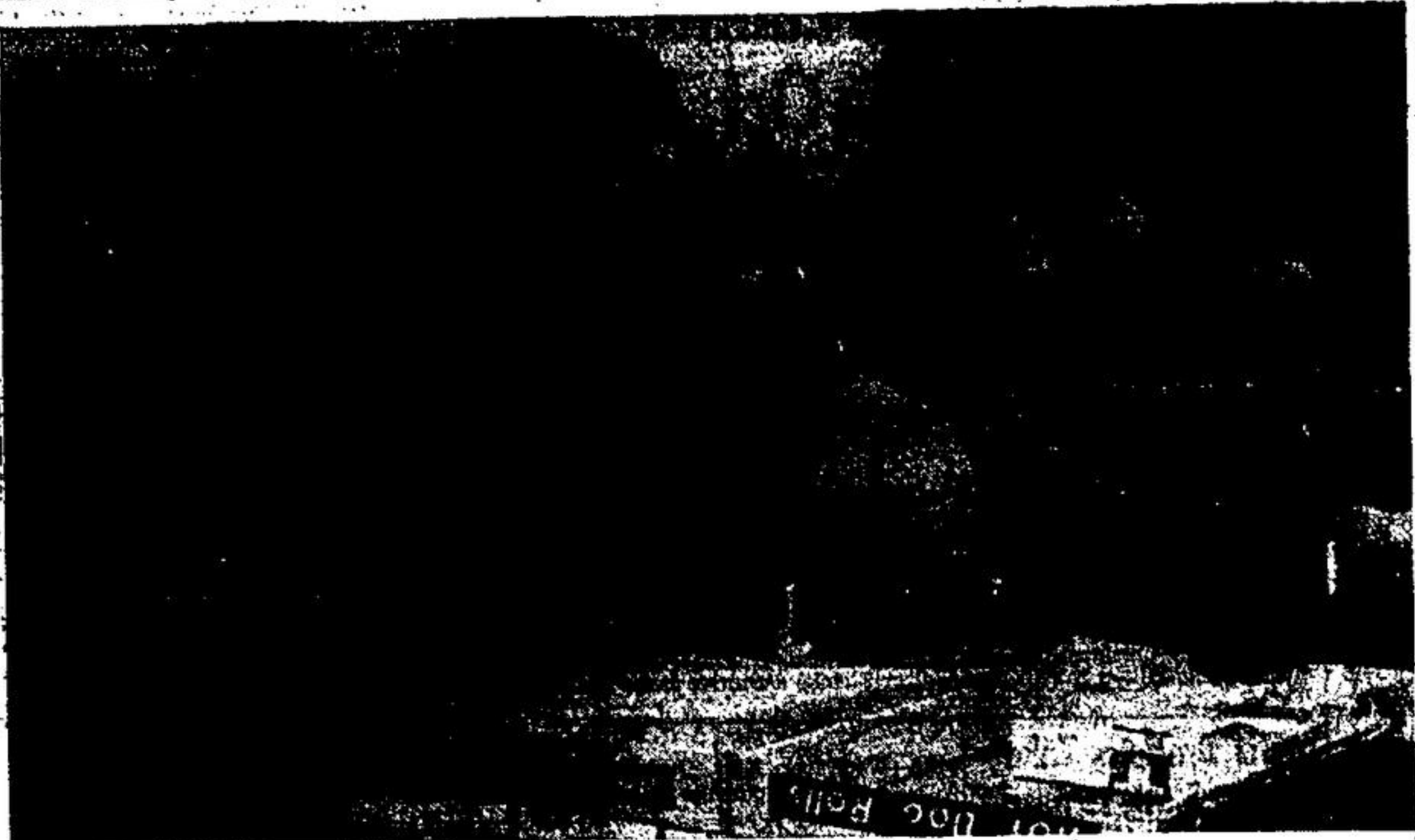

Rugger Beavers Register Second Win From St. Kitts

Georgetown Beavers of the International Rugger League will be out to make it three wins in a row when they clash with University of Buffalo in the border town Saturday, Sept. 16.

Beavers scored 8 points in each half here Sunday when they captured their second victory of the young campaign by downing the St. Catharines Wasps 16 to 6.

St. Kitts, playing against the wind opened the scoring on an unusual play. After pushing Beavers right back to their own goal line the visitors' outside half booted a drop kick on the

side, shook off three tacklers and plunged over to tie the score.

Les Judge was good on the convert attempt and Beavers led 5-3. Just before half time Ferguson was tackled before he had possession of the ball and the ensuing penalty kick by Judge made it 8-3 from 25 yds. out.

Al Ferguson broke the game wide open early in the second half. After faking a pass to Lavell he took off on a 60 yard gallop outracing four St. Kitts' backfielders to score right between the posts. Judge's convert made it 13-3.

The Beavers tackled with authority in the second half and kept St. Catharines backs from roaming outside their own zone. Outstanding for Beavers during this defensive effort were Lavell Wrigglesworth, Smith, Atkinson, Turnbull and MacIntosh.

St. Kitts added their second three-pointer when they surprised Beavers with a short quick-kick. Their forwards bogged their way over the goal line for a well-deserved touch-down.

Beavers had the last word. Doug Harley took a pass from Al Ferguson and powered his way into the corner for the score taking three tacklers with him. The convert attempt was short leaving it a 16-6 ball game.

From a scrimmage on the 12 yard line Ferguson took the ball by himself around the short
