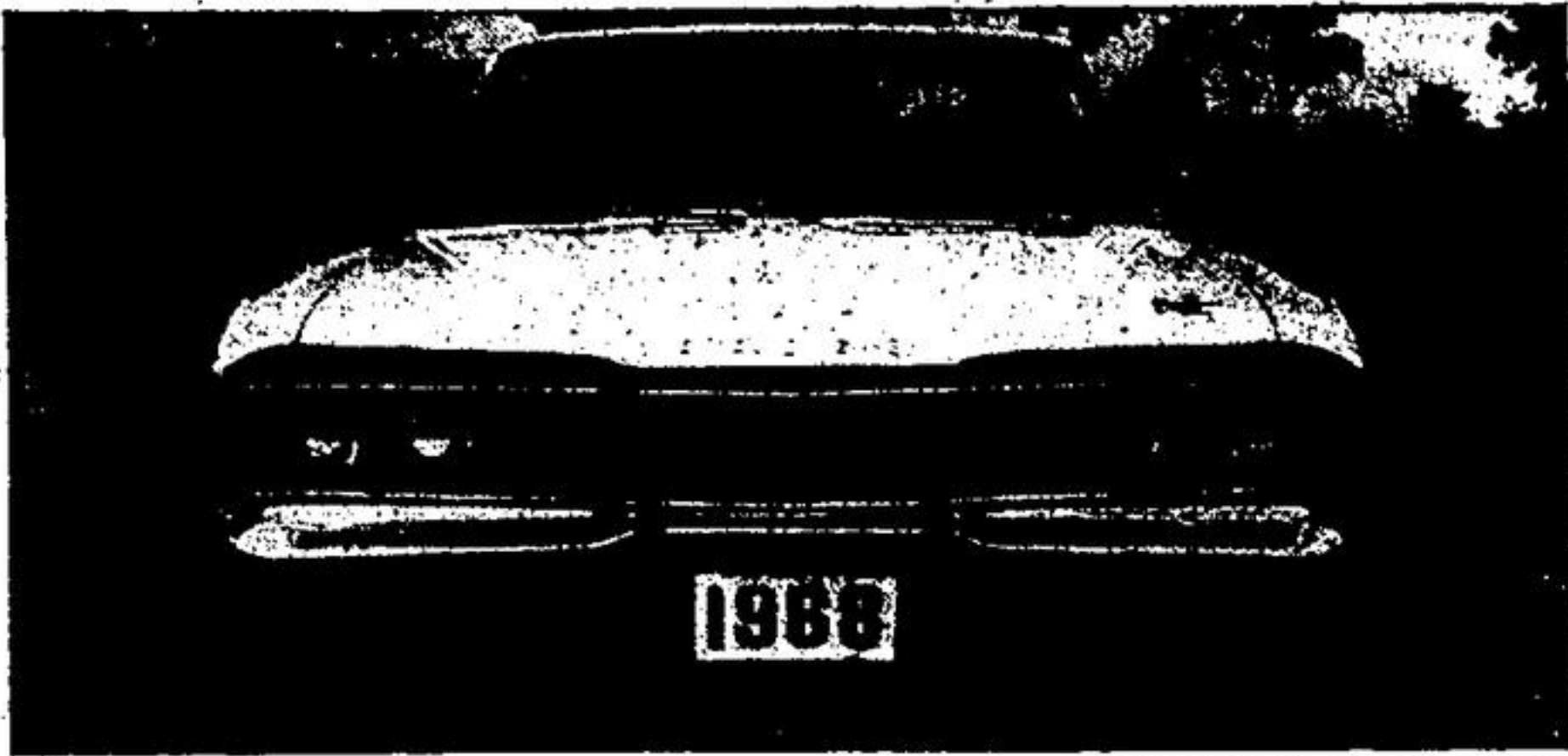

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hopes for a good turnout. See you at the Ladies Auxiliary Birthday Supper and Dance on Friday, September 15th.

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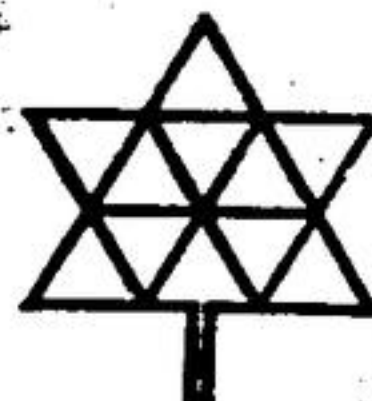
