## Suggests Mill Waste Be Removed Through Sewerage System

In reply to a letter from Mayor Joseph Gibbons, J.H. Robertson, vice president and general manager of Dornier Paper, Montreal, stated he was surprised to hear of further complaints of odour from the mill as he understood the odour was now substantially reduced.

He suggested a practical method of improving the situation would be the direct entry of the effluent into the municipal sewer system. He claimed pollution consultants had stated this would not overload either the sewer pipe lines or the effluent clarifier.

Mr. Robertson admitted the clarifier might need more frequent cleaning, but the extra charge could be passed on to the mill. In this manner the lagoon could be eliminated.

"It's my understanding that the OWRC said we could not handle the effluent straight out of the mill" said Cr. Roy Ballentine. "I'd like to contact them and get their views on the matter."

The mayor contended it should help Dornier to put the effluent in the sewer, "but would it help our sewage disposal plant?" he asked.

The matter was left with Sanitation Chairman Roy Ballentine who will report his findings to council.

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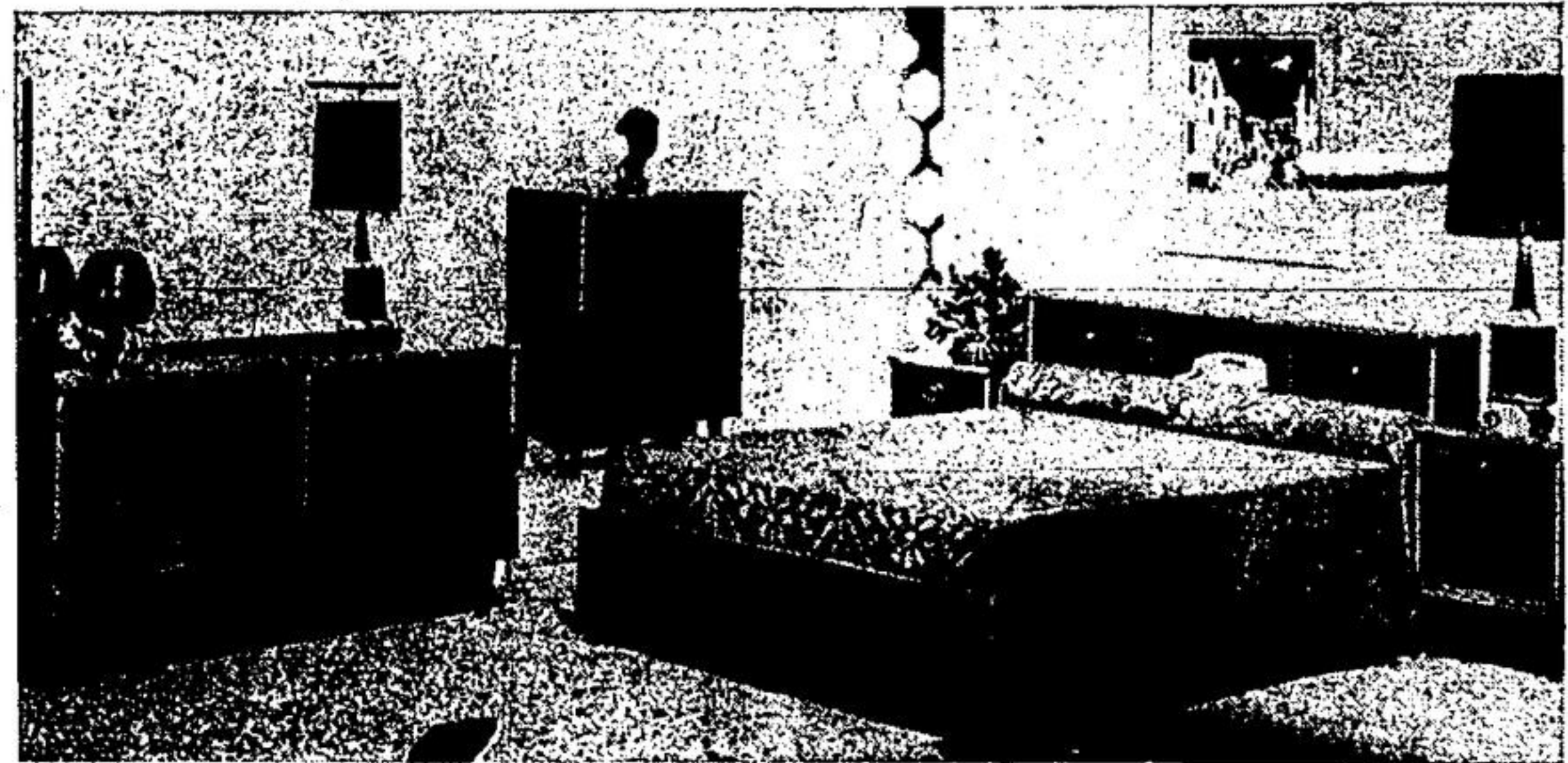
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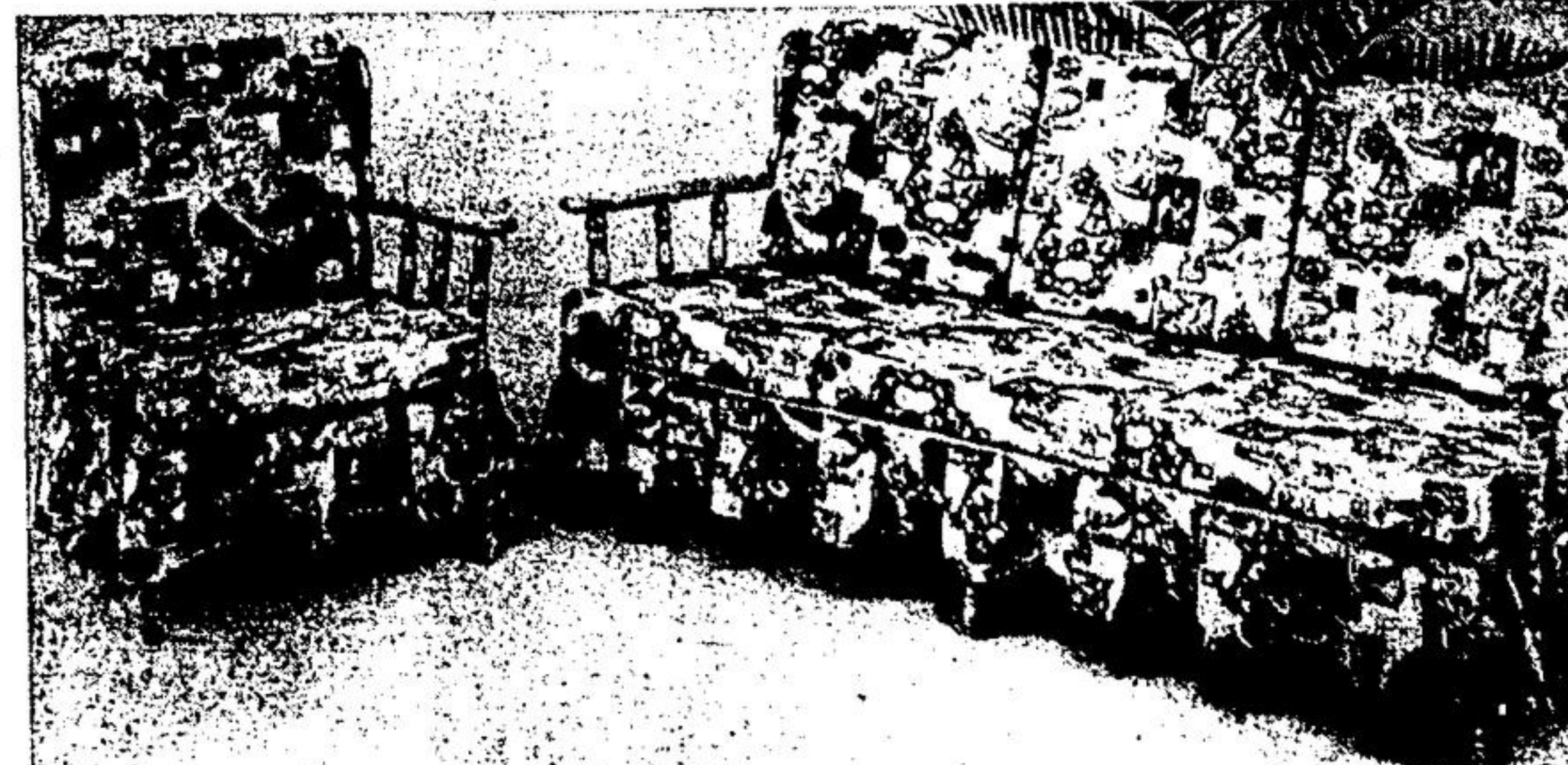
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
