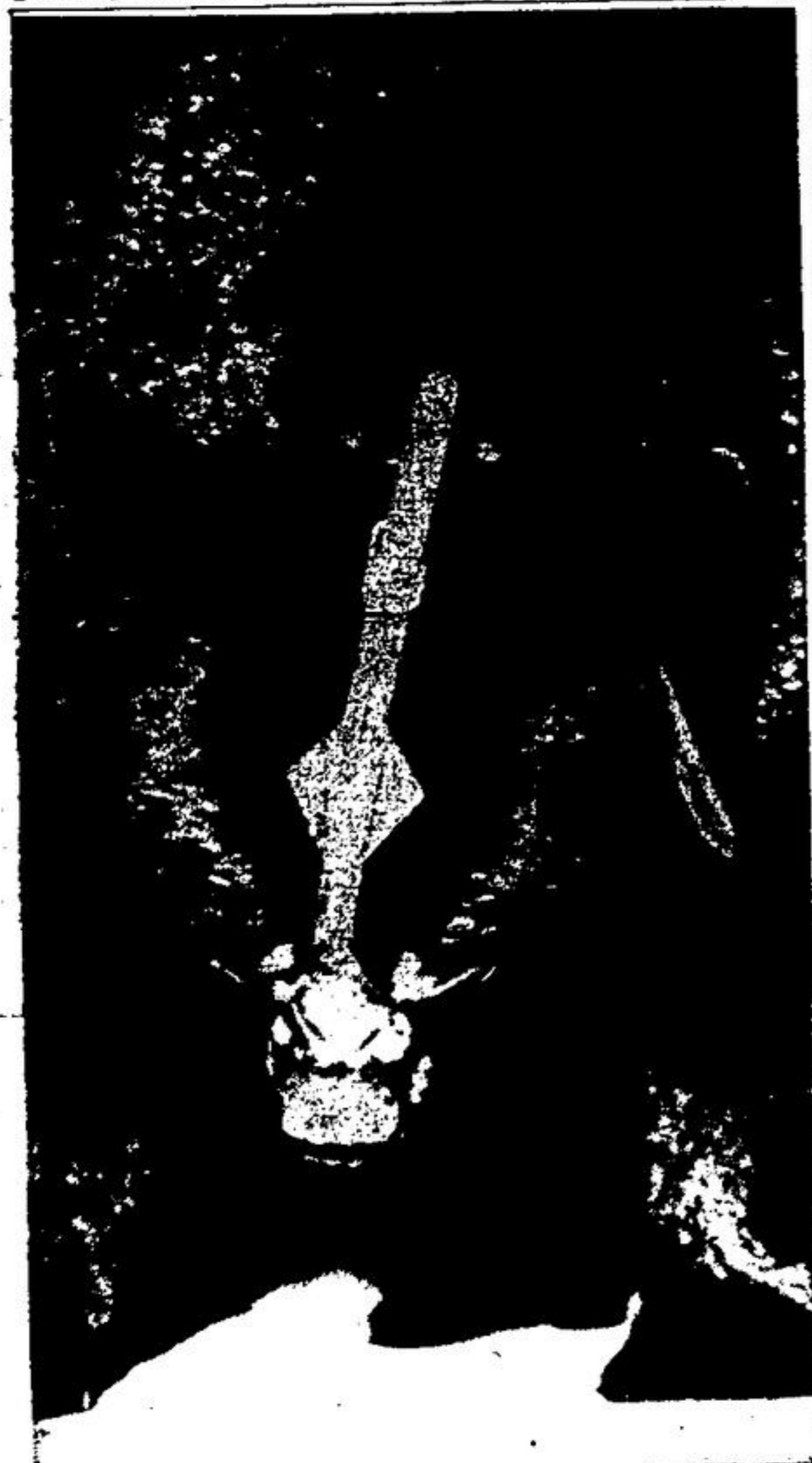
LAWN BOWLING NEWS

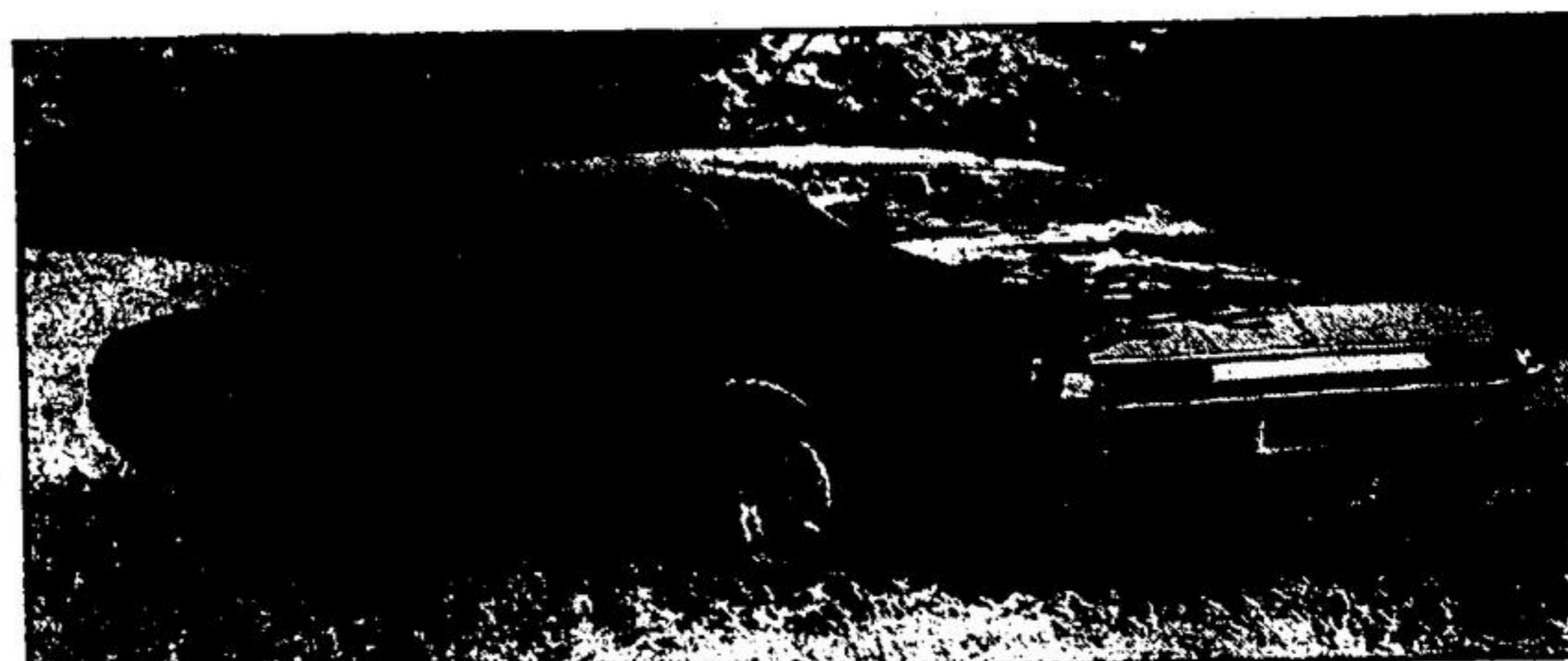
