OF COURSE, STAY ON THE LINE AND TALK SLOWLY AND CLEARLY, GIVING YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS AND THE REASON FOR CALLING. TRY TO REMAIN CALM AND TO ANSWER ALL QUESTIONS PROMPTLY, GIVING A BRIEF BUT COMPLETE DESCRIPTION OF THE EMERGENCY. WAIT FOR INSTRUCTIONS FROM THE POLICE.
