Peel, Halton Officials Discuss Merger of Health Service Depts.

Peel and Halton counties are about to get better and more standardized public health services for less money.

The two counties will amalgamate their health services some time in the near future in accordance with legislation passed by the province, moving toward the trend of regional government or larger areas governed by one body.

Under the current system, health units receive half of their operating costs from the province and half must be raised locally.

With the new and larger health areas already specified in legislation enacted by the province, the province will pay 75 per cent of the costs, leaving 25 per cent to be raised by the health area.

As an added incentive to speed the specified amalgamation all federal grants to health units as they now stand will be cut off in 1968.

So there is little doubt Peel and Halton will unite their health services as a meeting last week of the two units and interested councillors from both counties indicated.

What it means in terms of specified programs is not yet clear.

New Program

The province will release details of programs including budgetary figures some time in October.

Last week's meeting at the Peel County council chambers set up a committee that will report to the larger body when the information is received.

"The province is demanding certain programs be instituted in return for the increased subsidies," said Dr. H.J. Lambert, director of the Peel County health unit.
