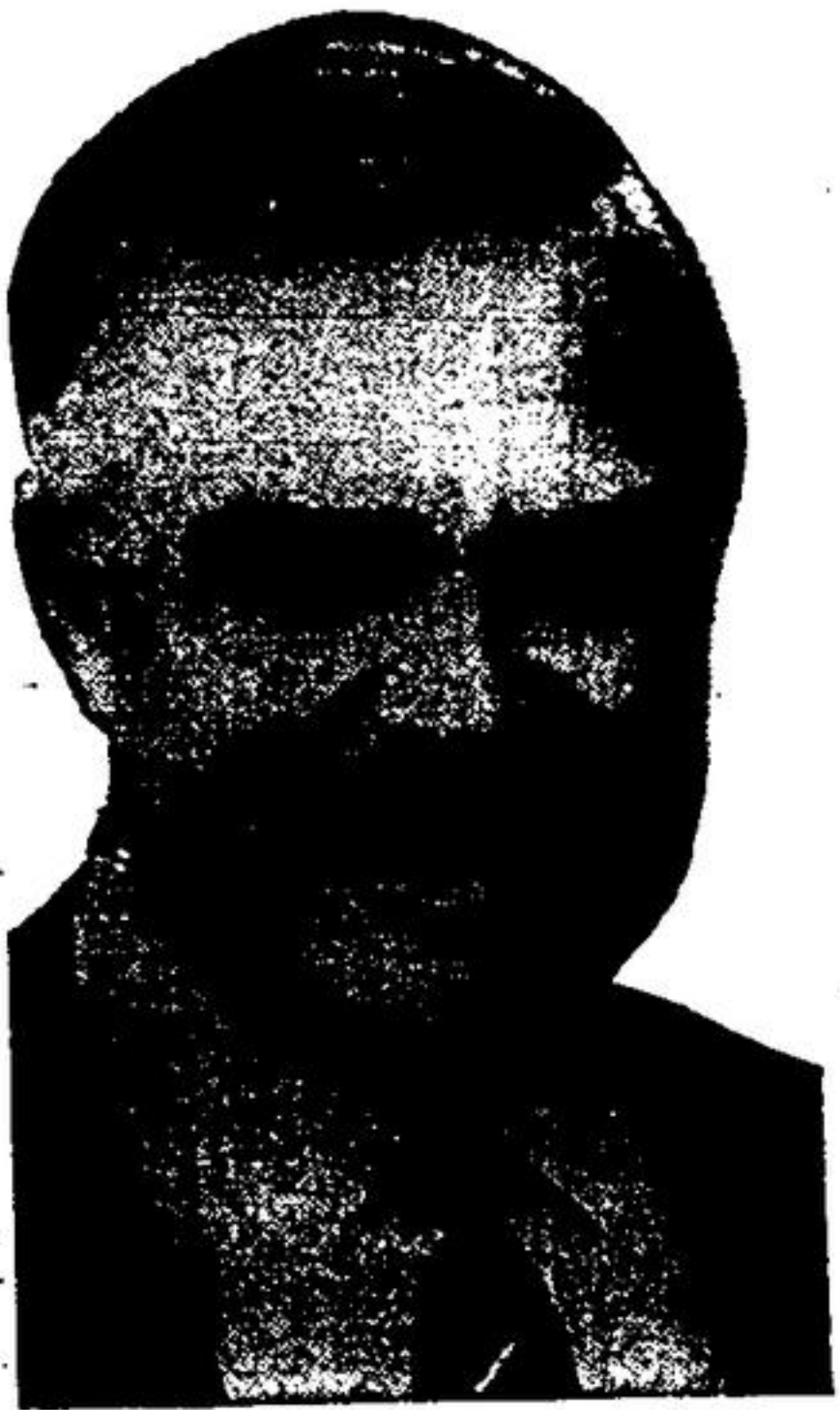
town, Bramalea, Toronto, Clarkson, Guelph and Kilworthy.

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Says Cable TV Will Give Local Viewers 9 Channels

A Georgetown skyline free of what he terms "dangerous and unsightly hardware" is what Mr. Clinton Forster of Noram TV Cable Construction Co. hopes will come about as a result of his firm's decision to bring cable television here.

In a press release to The Herald this week Mr. Forster said Georgetown residents, as in other cable TV communities will remove their roof top antennas and towers as they connect to the cable service clearing the skyline of "dangerous and unsightly hardware that has become so common."

His company's system in its simplest form relies on three components, he explained: a precision antenna that sits atop a tower and intercepts TV signals, a cable attached to the community's power line poles, and amplifiers specifically designed to boost the signal as it moves through the cables to home TV sets.

"With such equipment, television signals originating as far as 200 miles away can be caught given new strength and sent clear and strong into the home," he said.

Mr. Forster claimed there are 2,000 such systems operating in the USA and another 460 in Canada, 75 of these in Ontario.

"Where the viewer would otherwise have no television the Community Antenna Television System (CATV) provides it; where he has limited television CATV provides more, and where a viewer is getting less than good quality reception CATV provides high quality reception," he said.

The release said Georgetown residents would have a choice of nine channels, and as more channels go on the air, particularly UHF educational channels, cable TV will provide a full complement of twelve TV stations to Georgetown subscribers.

"Interference splashes up a colour screen far more than it does a black-and-white screen, but with CATV the colour is sharp and true. In Georgetown CATV will open the door to enjoyable colour reception," said Mr. Forster.

Noram Cable Construction Ltd., is in the business of engineering and constructing CATV systems, and according to the press release will go to the expense of \$250,000. to establish and complete an operating system here.

Land is being acquired near town upon which the antenna will be constructed.

"As well as making Georgetown a more attractive community in which to live and visit this will add another important industry benefiting the economy of the community," Mr. Forster concluded.
