Acton, Principal Hansen and Board member Mr. Watson. Erin, Principal Finnie.

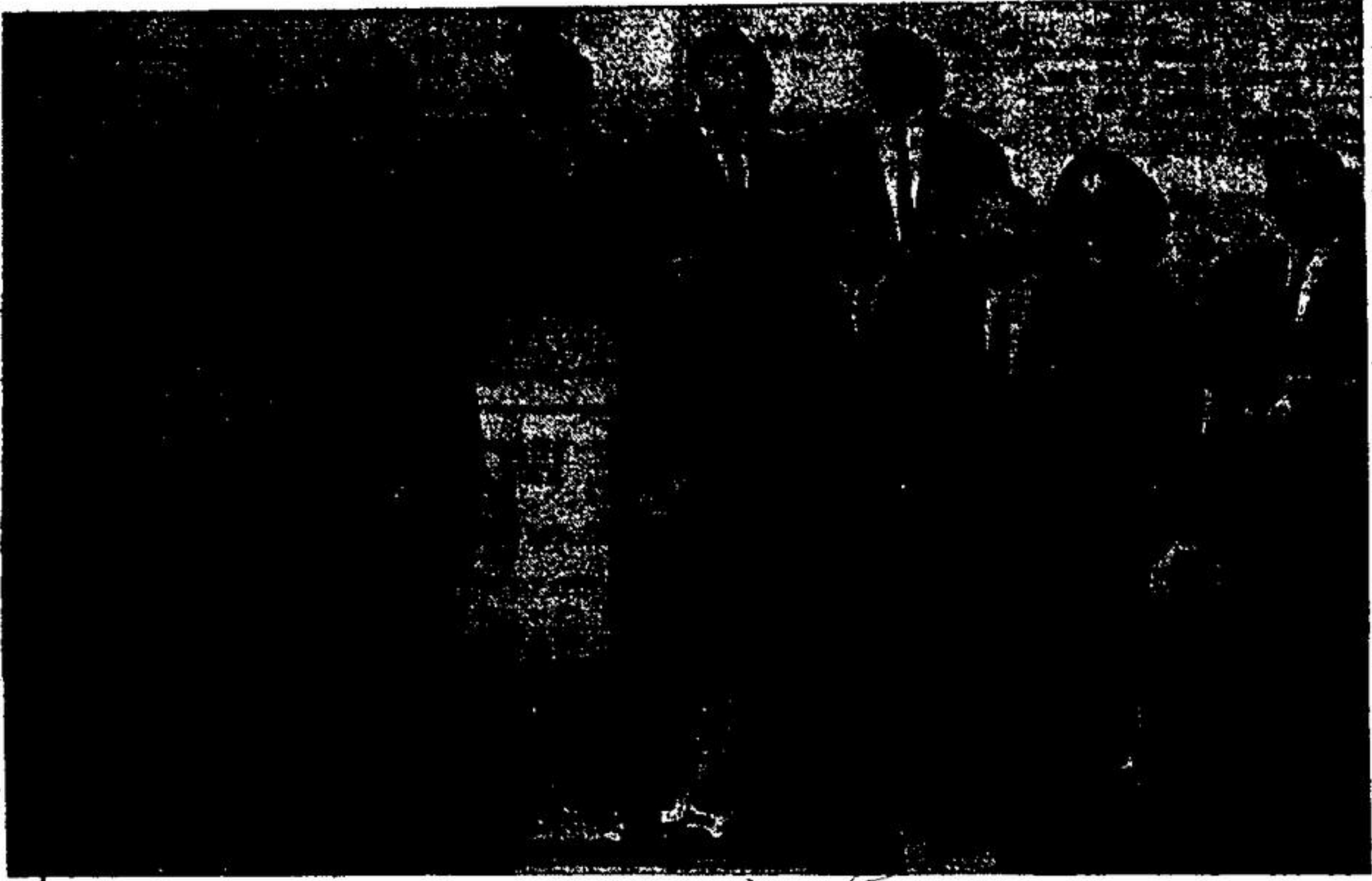
Georgetown, Principal Turner and chairman of the board, Mr. E. A. Gorth.

Two Touchdowns Defeat GDHS In Football Opener

Deep passes killed Georgetown High School's senior football team, The Rebels, Thursday as they dropped the league opener in Georgetown park against Guelph collegiate for the first time in three years.

The Guelph quarter-back found receivers wide open for passes that went for unconverted touchdowns in the first and second halves. Despite the mud the big green team moved well along the ground as well as through the air. Most of the game was played in a steady downpour.

The Guelph team outclassed the red and blue in every department and seemed to relish the poor field conditions as they fashioned the 12-0 victory.

The first quarter was scoreless. Guelph controlled the ball running for yardage twice on 3rd down situations. Twice the Georgetown Rebel defense tightened to prevent touchdowns with Guelph inside the ten yard line. With the 2nd quarter half over a mix up in pass coverage gave the Guelph quarter-back a wide open receiver. He promptly hit him with a twenty-five yard touchdown strike.

The same play produced another six points in the 2nd half. The Georgetown defensive half tripped as he cut through a sand jumping pit near the goal line.

An offside penalty cancelled a Rebel touchdown. Bill Dwyer picked up a fumble and dashed 45 yards to score only to have the play called back. This seemed to be the trend for the day as every good offensive gain was nullified by a penalty.

Highlighting the offensive team was the running of Popiel and Hills and the blocking of MacKinnon and Todd. Defensively Fogal, Burrows, and Dwyer were outstanding.

In the first game of the doubleheader the Georgetown high school junior football team demonstrated to onlookers that it is a proud, hard-charging team, eager to play the game and jealous of every inch of ground. Georgetown scored the first touchdown but lost to Guelph Centennials 10-7.

With crisp blocking the Georgetown offensive line cut down Guelph defenders and allowed Hugh Williams to turn the corner and beat the secondary to the goal line in a sweep down the left sideline. The convert attempt misfired.

Centennial Juniors scored a point on a double flanker sweep from four yards out. The convert was good for a 7-6 lead. Georgetown drew even on a kick worked to perfection by Stewart at the helm.

One of the disappointing calls from a Georgetown standpoint nullified a 60 yard touchdown run by Bruce Davies who bulled through the centre of the Guelph defenders and broke several tackles en route to the end zone.

Georgetown manager Al Murphy used seven outfielders, switching frequently to get as many in the final game play as possible. When it was over Judy Sheppard, Ann Marchment, Joanne Arnold, Laurie Seckington, Beth Richardson, Gail Young and Carol Lawson all has put in outfield time.
