Pre-season inter-league exhibition games have kept Lewis hopping these past few weeks, many of them involving NHL clubs. This past weekend for example saw him handle a Koochester vs. St. Louis Blues encounter, on Saturday and New York Rangers vs. Buffalo Bisons, Sunday.

The pre-season tilts will take care of most of his nights right up until almost mid-October.

His regular circuit will mean many hours in the air, leap frogging between Houston, Dallas, San Diego, Fort Worth, Memphis, Oklahoma City, Portland, Seattle, Phoenix, Buffalo, Rochester, Vancouver, Quebec City and other points.

In fact the travel end of it is so involved that he has dumped the whole thing in the capable lap of the local Barber and Henley Travel Agency.

When regular schedules got underway way Lewis will be away from home two and three weeks at a time. He'll spend the better part of a week at home between swings.

Bryan is the son of the Georgetown fifth Chief Erwin Lewis and Mrs. Lewis, 22 Normandy Blvd. He's been living in Cooksville since marrying Elaine Pallett last year.

He and John McCauley of Brampton who also made it to the NHL stable this fall became the second and third Tri-County referee to reach the hockey heights. Bruce Hood, of Milton was the first.
