

Skuce Would Ease Tax Burden for Education

Halton East Liberal candidate Robin Skuce charged this week that the Roberts' Government at Queen's Park has failed to relieve the municipal taxpayers of the overburdening costs of education.

Skuce said high education costs are causing hardship and suffering among local taxpayers who are paying heavy property taxes.

Skuce also charged that the Conservative Government has failed to update expropriation laws, while at the same time failing to meet the problem of air and water pollution.

Skuce, a United Church minister and a former Appleby Col-

lege teacher, said his campaign to date has centred around "mainstreaming and meeting voters."

He said he was "impressed and encouraged by the acceptance he is receiving, and he added: Many people frankly told me they were voting for me because they were tired of unfulfilled Conservative promises."

"And that's exactly why I'm in this election," he said. "In my mind — and in the minds of many others — the Conservative government has been in power so long they have grown out of touch with the opinions and hopes of the people."

ernment has been run like a private club — "for members only, while the voters have been frustrated and left to fend for themselves as best they can."

Skuce is running against Conservative entry Jim Snow and NDPer Bill Gillies in the Halton East campaign. None of the candidates entered in the race has previous Legislature experience.

Warm, Dry Weather Aid To Maturing Corn Crop

The area corn crop has matured very rapidly because of the warm dry weather of the past few weeks, county agricultural representative Henry Stanley reported this week.

He said some farmers have already started to fill their silos, and advised all farmers whose corn is in the late dough stage to ensile it now before frosts dry out the ears and lower the vitamin content.

At this stage the ear accounts for half the dry matter yield of the silage, and the whole plant is between 65 and 70 per cent moisture, he said.

"For a large silo you can go as low as 60 per cent moisture

and still make good silage," he said. "but a small silo with less compaction will not preserve dry silage too well."

Protein Content
To the question of adding urea to corn silage, Stanley said feed grade urea would raise its protein content and lower the amount of protein required in the grain mixture.

"If you are feeding two-thirds or more of your dairy cattle roughage requirements as corn silage, you might consider adding urea to the silage," he said.

"If you feed less than two-thirds corn silage, the protein should be supplied through the grain mix."

Stanley cautioned that urea should be added only to silage that is sufficiently mature to prevent seepage, which could result in too great a concentration of urea at the bottom.

Spread on Top
The usual amount is 10 pounds of urea per ton of silage, usually spread over the top of the load at the time of silo filling and mixed uniformly.

For beef cattle there are urea-calcium additives to be added in the same way in the amount of 20 pounds per ton of silage. Calcium is believed to be of no value to dairy cattle.
