

## Choose Armstrong Chairman for New Police Commission

At the first meeting of the newly formed Board of Commissioners of Police last Wednesday in the municipal building, John T. Armstrong was chosen to act as chairman of the Commission for the remainder of 1967.

The Commission consists of Hon. Allan Sprague, Halton County judge, Mayor Joseph Gibbons and John T. Armstrong.

Judge Sprague acted as temporary chairman until the permanent chairman was appointed, referring to sections of the Police Act to outline the duties of a Commission. He pointed out that meetings would be open to the public, except for personnel meetings which would be in camera. He explained that the members of a Board of Police Commissioners, under the act,

are the head of a council, a judge of any district or county, and a citizen at large.

Mayor Gibbons welcomed the members saying he foresaw the establishment of a Board of Commissioners of Police as a great benefit to the town. In moving the motion to have Mr. Armstrong act as chairman, the mayor stated he knew Judge Sprague was a busy man, "I

hope and expect you will be willing to give us your advice both as a judge and an experienced member of a police commission," he added.

Chairman John T. Armstrong thanked the two other members for their confidence in him, and willing to give us your advice. The meeting adjourned immediately as Judge Sprague had to attend a funeral.

## Still Mystery When or If Plunkett Report Activated

The Plunkett Report is still far from being an operational tool of the Roberts government according to John Roberts, himself.

The report, which recommends that Halton and Peel counties be divided into two regions — a rural northern area and a southern urban area with separate ruling bodies for each — was introduced over a year ago, but spokesmen in the Department of Municipal Affairs since then have not yet been able to say when, or if, it will go into operation.

Premier Roberts, speaking at a Saturday night rally in Halton East said after his speech that he could not give a date when the report would be activated.

"Since then, the Smith Report (on taxation) has also made several recommendations regarding regional government and these too must be studied," he said.

"We don't want to force the municipalities into anything."

Premier Roberts said that the government "has not simply let the Plunkett Report lie idle at Queen's Park" — rather, it has been the subject of a very close study.

"It may be taking a long time to put it into action, but then it has to be in effect for a much

longer time," he said. He added that the election campaign has not delayed the report at all.

The Plunkett Report was made after all the municipal bodies in the area presented their views on the subject of regional government. Since the report was released, there have been mixed reactions to it. Most of the northern regions strenuously opposed it.

"We must remember, in considering this, that not every body favoured it," the premier said. "We can't just force it on

Richard suggested that when the traffic lights being used at the Mountainview bridge detour are no longer necessary, that they be moved to the John St. culvert.

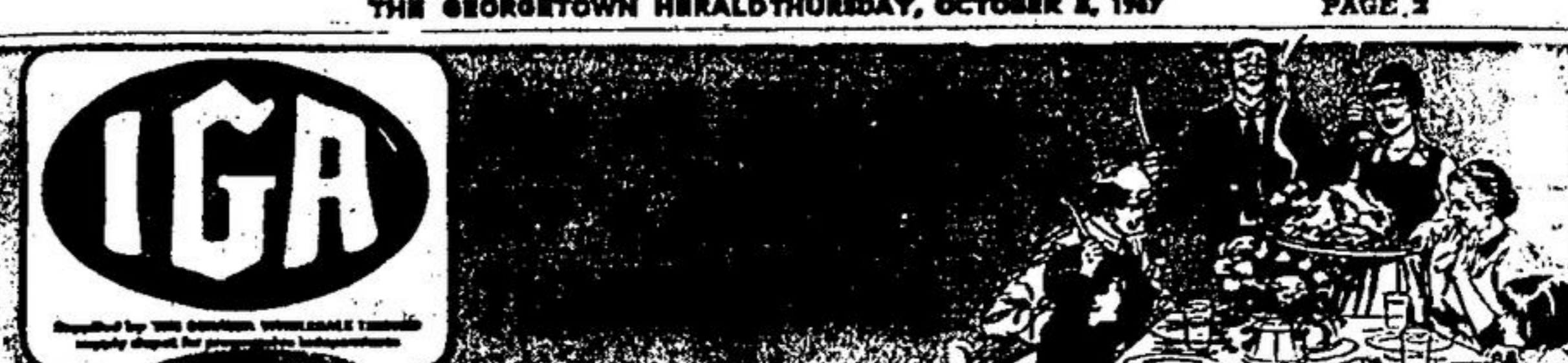
"It was in council's mind to do this," said Deputy Reeve Speight.
