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Welcome New Teachers At Federation Meeting

The Esqueing branch of the Federation of Women's Teachers Associations of Ontario held its first meeting of the new school year on Thursday, Sept. 28th at Park School. Teachers from Acton, Georgetown and Esqueing Township attended the Fall Tea. Despite the dismal weather many members were present.

The president of the Esqueing Association, Mrs. Vera MacDonald, opened the meeting by welcoming the teachers who were new to the area or to teaching itself. She stressed how the federation is of help to its members.

Next the ladies from each school were introduced by the school representatives. After the minutes of the last meeting had been read by the secretary, Mrs. Milree Armstrong, Mrs. Eva Presswood gave an informative report on the annual meeting. Always an enthusiastic supporter of the organization, Mrs. Presswood volunteered after the two appointed representatives were unable to attend. At the close of the meeting the president thanked Mrs. Anne Rudy for providing the refreshments. The next meeting will be a dinner meeting to be held in late November.

Halton Member Criticizes NHA Interest Rate Increase

Dr. Harry Harley, Halton's M.P., became the second Liberal party member to publicly criticize the government's increase in the National Housing Act interest rate, to a record eight and a quarter per cent. The increase was made in an effort to attract more mortgage money to the housing market.

In an interview Dr. Harley said that the people who need help are those who are above the medium income range where they can qualify for public housing, but do not earn enough to move into the NHA or conventional mortgage field.

"I believe the situation is serious enough to call for a federal-provincial conference on housing. In the Commons the Minister agreed with that — but it will be difficult to arrange one now with three provincial elections taking place," he said.

Dr. Harley feels the present NHA ceiling of \$18,000 on new house mortgages and \$10,000 on existing houses should be raised. He also wants to see more direct government spending in the public housing field.

"The interest rate increase will bring more mortgage money into the field, but it won't do anything for the people who most need the help. Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation may have to embark on a program similar to that of the war-time houses when 50,000 units were constructed to meet

the emergency — during and right after the war," he said.

The new rate means that: — the cost of a maximum \$18,000 NHA 25 year will rise from \$38,661 to \$42,084.

— the cost of conventional mortgages in the Halton region could rise to nine and a quarter per cent.

— second mortgages could rise to 14 per cent and higher.

— the minimum income to qualify for an NHA loan will be raised to about \$8,100.

Georgetown Man is Injured, Ship Fire

A Georgetown man was injured in a fire aboard the bulk carrier Ontario Power a few miles off the shore of Cape Breton, according to Canadian Press reports.

Robert McKay, 20, with two other members of the ship's crew, is in fair condition in hospital in Sydney, N.S. after suffering extensive burns.

A spokesman for the ship's Toronto owners said the men were injured in what was described as a "flash fire."

They were brought to hospital at Neil's Harbour, in northern Cape Breton and transferred to hospital in Sydney.

OF COURSE STAY ON THE LINE AND TALK SLOWLY AND CLEARLY, GIVING YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS AND THE REASON FOR CALLING. TRY TO REMAIN CALM AND TO ANSWER ALL QUESTIONS PROMPTLY, GIVING A BRIEF BUT COMPLETE DESCRIPTION OF THE EMERGENCY. WAIT FOR INSTRUCTIONS FROM THE POLICEMAN OR FIREMAN. I hope that you never have to use the telephone for such an emergency call, but if you do, it can be a trusty and speedy servant.**

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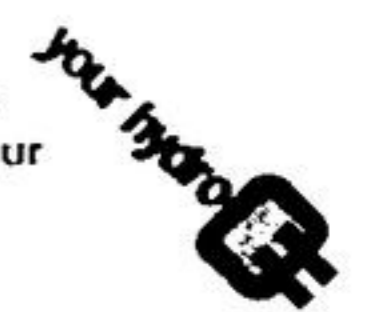
