SILVER'S

Salutes Frederick Carter and Ambrose Shea

When an intercolonial conference was called at Quebec City in 1864 to draw up a constitution for a proposed Confederation of British North American provinces, Newfoundland sent one Liberal and one Conservative as delegates. These men, Ambrose Shea and Frederick Carter were to find themselves in the position of having helped write the constitution for a country they would never see their own province join.

Though Carter and Shea always remained persuaded that Newfoundlanders should "end our present isolation" by joining Confederation, they were unable to overcome the opposition of their compatriots. Newfoundlanders traded with many countries, but hardly at all with Canada. And when the trans-Atlantic cable connected them by telegraph with England in 1866, they felt closer than ever to Europe and farther from the Canadian mainland.

Though Carter became premier of Newfoundland in 1865, and was able to form a bi-partisan cabinet with Shea as its other leading light, he could still get nothing more than "uncertain" support for Confederation. He met the same disappointment as premier again in 1874, and, like Shea, died three-quarters of a century before his dream was finally realized.

Yet Carter and Shea were no less Fathers of our Country for all that. For their part in writing the Canadian constitution they too deserve their places in the famous Notman photograph — and in the history of Canada.
