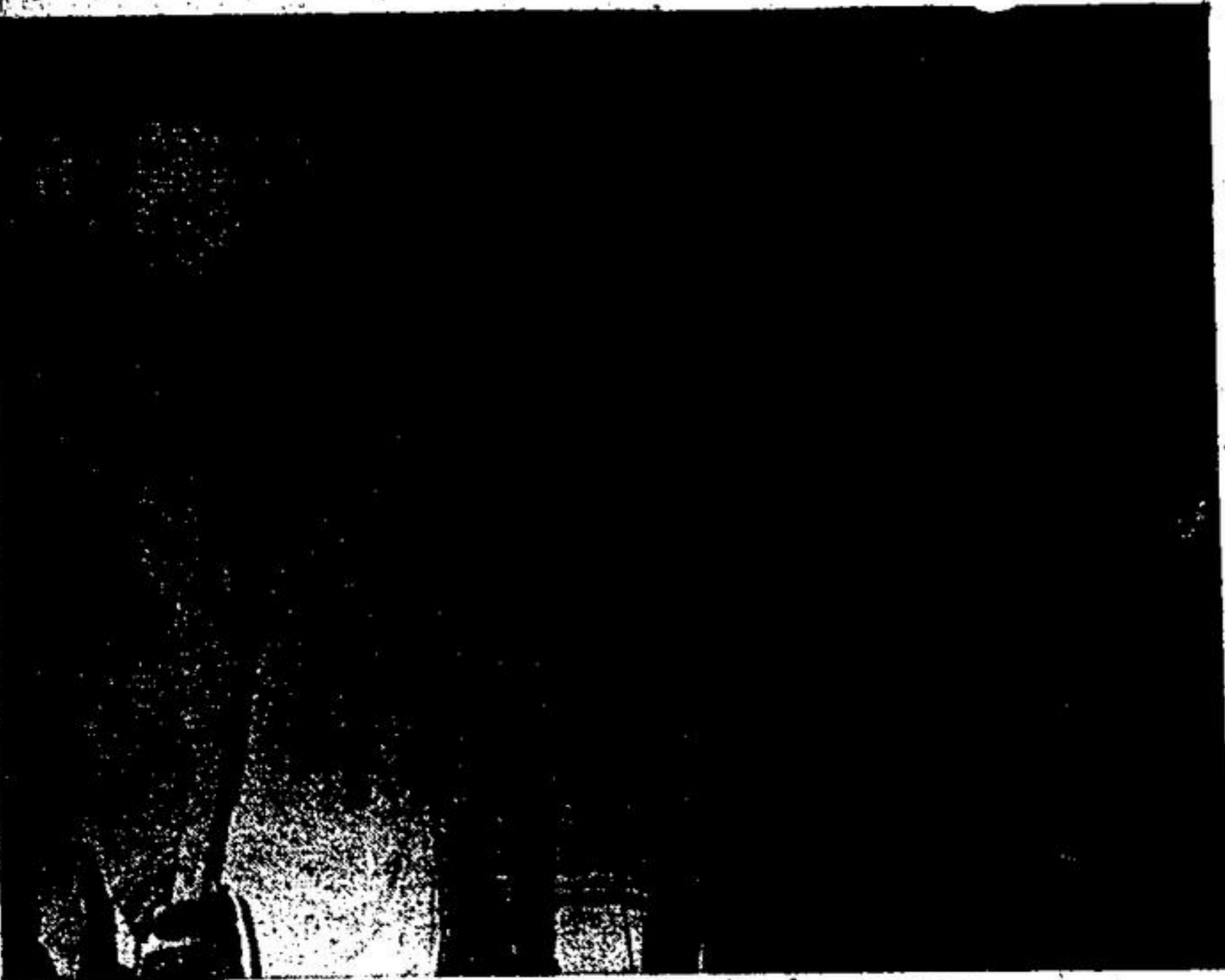


Star at School

October PS Reports Replaced with Letters

In a trend toward flexibility, the Georgetown Public School Board, Wednesday night, endorsed a suggestion of the Principals' Association that the October report cards be either written or oral messages to the parents. The choice will be left to the individual principals and their staff.

There will still be three formal report cards, said Principal Val Stein, to coincide with the new three equal school terms. Easter holidays have now been eliminated by the Department of Education and replaced by a week's holiday from March 16 to 24. The move is designed to break up the long winter period, which frequently occurs when Easter is late. Good Friday will still be a holiday.

In all probability the three formal report cards will also be changed with less emphasis on marks and more on written commentary. Principal Val Stein representing the Principals' Association stated a letter explaining the policy will be sent to parents before the end of October. The Board asked to see a copy of the letter before it was sent out. In addition, in February parents of students achieving less than 65% will be interviewed.

Area Superintendent O. W. McDowell explained that the Department of Education curriculum guide is definitely opposed to reporting to parents in a numerical manner. "The emphasis today is on individual assessment and flexibility," he maintained. He contended the object of report cards is the establishment of contact with the parents, and the showing of the child's progress in comparison with his own ability, not with other students.
