Says NDP Would Pay 80% Education

William Gillies, the NDP candidate for Halton East addressed a group of supporters in the William Chard Home on Elizabeth Street last Wednesday night.

He attacked the HOME project rumoured for this area, claiming it would put a floor under current real estate values, and be out of the reach of most working men. "Only those earning eight thousand a year could afford them," he warned.

He claimed a NDP government would assume 80% of the education costs, thus relieving the burden on the home owner. He advocated a capital gains tax, and weigh-distance tax on highway transport to replace the property tax.

Saturday A.M. Blaze Leaves Family of Five Homeless

An R R 2, Georgetown family was left homeless and with little more than the clothes on their backs when fire ravaged their home early Saturday morning. At press time Mr. and Mrs. Steve Larsen are living in a Brampton motel and their three children are with a neighbor.

They were chased from their home on the 8th line of Esquesing a mile south of Georgetown by flames and smoke after they were awakened by the barking of their dog. Two of the youngsters were forced to leap from an upstairs bedroom, and one

of them suffered a minor back injury.

The blaze, which apparently started in their living room, spread rapidly through the house so quickly that by the time firemen arrived it had consumed much of the furniture and clothing.

When firemen left the scene early in the afternoon only the downstairs bedroom and kitchen had not been charred.

Red Cross workers and friends have helped provide clothing.

A second fire, later that same day, at the home of Ted Hancock, R R 1, Glen Williams, was out when firemen arrived.
