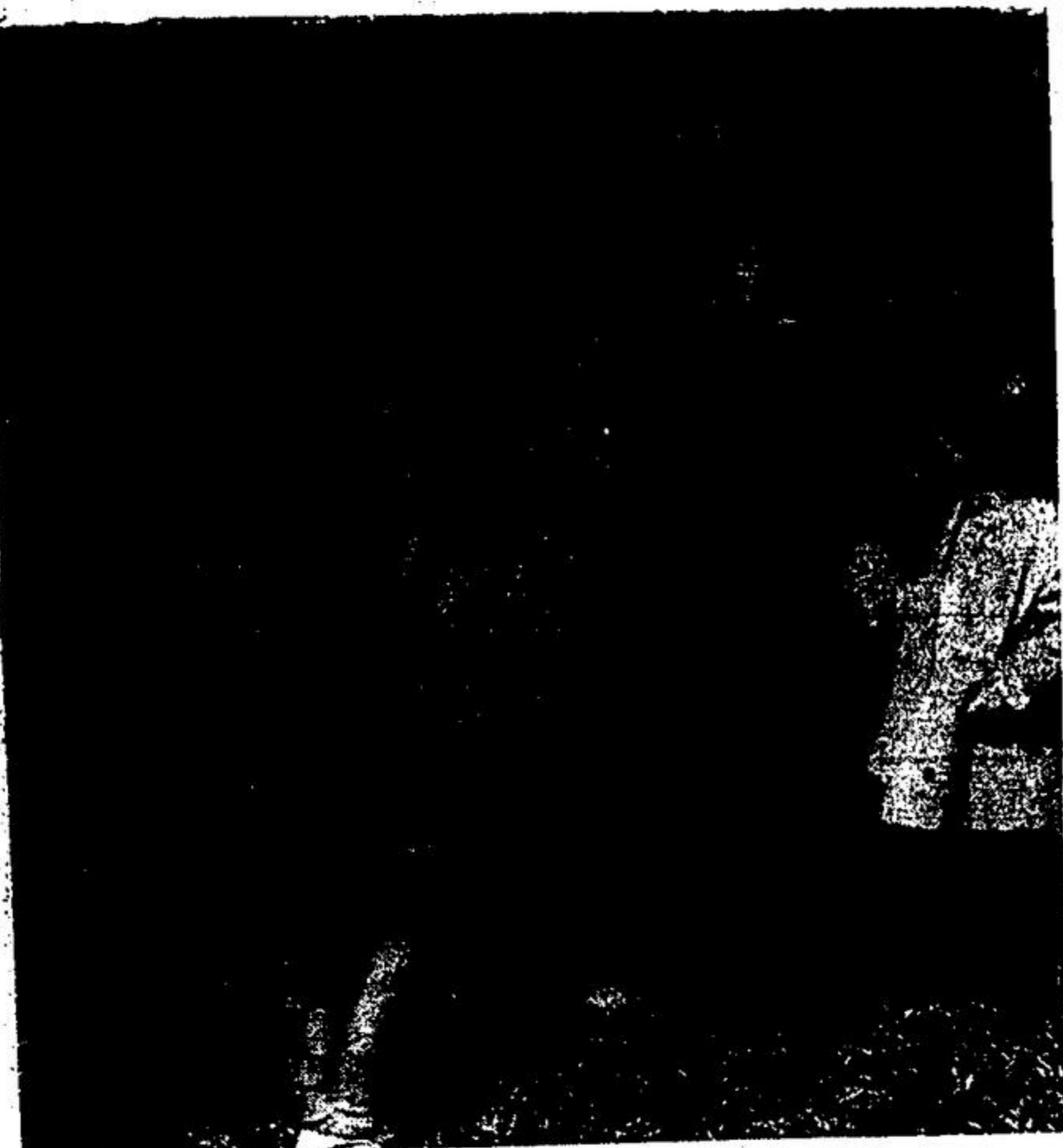

Halton County Holstein Breeders held a top quality show at Milton Fair on September 30th when twenty-three exhibitors brought out 102 animals. This was slightly better than last year's exhibits when seventeen breeders showed 98 head. The Judge was Gordon Innes, Woodstock.

Wm. J. Bennett, Burlington, took the Premier Breeder award with Gordon Sinclair and Sons, Burlington, in second place. The Premier Exhibitor was Howard Tarzwel, Georgetown, with Claude F. Picket, Georgetown, runner-up.

Burdholm Fond Kathy, who was Reserve Grand Champion at this show last year moved up to take the Grand Championship this year, after heading the class for four-year-old cows and being named Senior Champion. Kathy is a sharp dairy cow with a lot of breed character and an excellent udder. She took the best udder award for the second year in succession for her exhibitor, Mrs. Barbara Ford, Oakville.

H. C. Reid, Milton showed the Reserve Senior Grand Champion who stood first in the class for cows five years old and over. This was Maplewood Skokie Ella who is a strong topped cow, sharp of shoulder and very dairylike.

Howard Tarzwel, Georgetown, showed the Junior Champion female, and his daughter Nancy had the Reserve Junior. These were a fine pair of yearlings, with top junior yearling Wetthaven Molly Dewdrop Texal being the Champion, and the first prize senior yearling, Surodona Reflection Carrie the Reserve. Molly is of top quality with good balance, strong top and level quarter. Carrie is well grown with good depth of rib and a lot of strength.

The male Grand Champion, ship went to the only entry in the Koula and Moutou area he class for bulls two years or

over, Romandale Maple Tom, shown by Howard Tarzwel. Tom is a well balanced animal with good legs. The Junior Champion took the Reserve Grand award. This was Brent Maple Rocket's Prince, the winning yearling shown by Wm. J. Bennett. Prince is tall and sharp, with long deep rib and level quarter. The winning junior yearling, Benview Texal Patty Boy, shown by Wm. J. Bennett, was Reserve Junior Champion. This was a strong calf with good dairy quality.

Ashville Farms, Milton had the winning Breeder's herd Howard Tarzwel, showed the first prize get-of-sire, a group by Rosafe Citation R, and the first prize two year old, Claude F. Picket, Georgetown, showed the winning dry cow any age, and the first prize three year old cow. The entry of Barbara Ford won the Futurity class.
