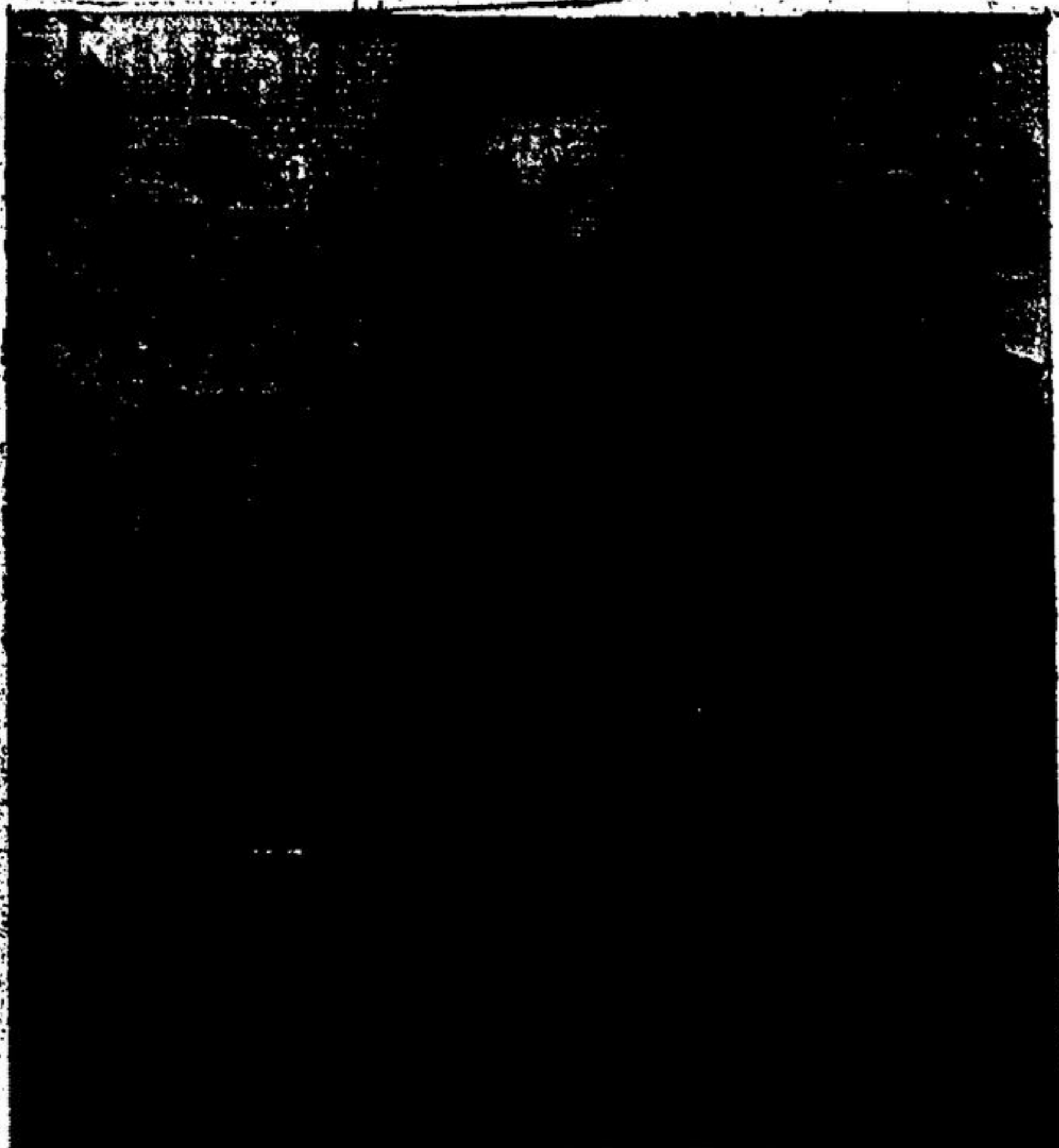


Perfect Execution

The Arts & Crafts of Georgetown held a committee meeting last Thursday to finalize their plans for the observance of their 25th anniversary next Saturday. It was held at the home of one of the conveners Mrs. Beatrice Clark.

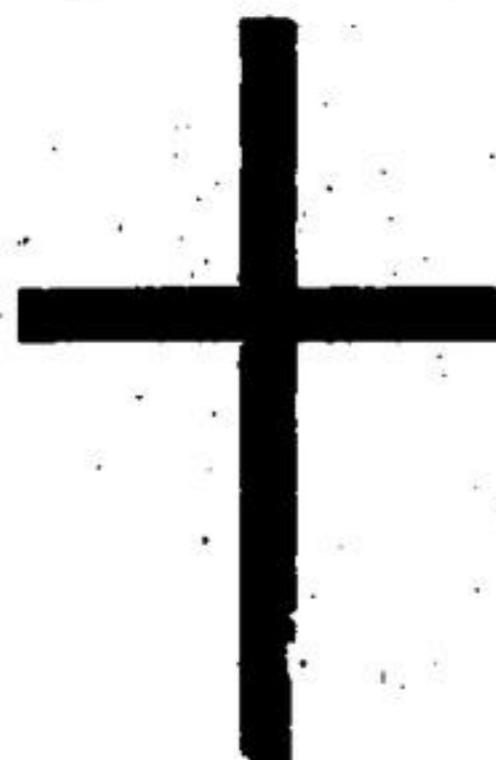
