As election returns came in, a seesaw contest was indicated. And the evening ended with the Progressive-Conservatives retaining their seat at Queen's Park by a scant 102

Jim Snow, P-C candidate in the newly created riding polled 9810; Robin Skuce, Liberal, 9708; and William Gillies NDP, 6388.

In Georgetown it was Snow 1306; Skuce 1219 and Gillies 1034. And in Esquesing Snow 813, Skuce 552 and Gil-

Mr. Snow will join a parliament in which Premier Robarts' government will have 69 seats, the Liberals 28 and

The results showed a sharp trend in P-C popularity from 1963 when George Kerr won handily with a majority of 6400 over Liberal Owen Mullin. Mr. Gillies was also NDP candidate that year, and increased his voting strength by 1200 on Monday.

In the new Halton West riding, George Kerr was returned to parliament for a second term, almost doubling the vote accorded Ted MacDonald, NDP, with Jack Lush, Liberal, trailing by another thousand votes.

Esquesing Won't **Endorse Education** Cost Plebiscite

An attempt by the county town to enlist Esquesing council's support in their fight to have the provincial government assume the total cost of education fell flat in the Esquesing .. council chamber Monday.


In a letter, copies of which were sent to local governments all over Ontario, Milton council asked Esquesing to see things their way, and place a question on the next ballot seeking opinions on who should pay the education tab.

The Millon request labled education costs an unreasonable burden on the municipatitles. Itadvocated dumping all expenses in the lap of Queen's Park and suggested this come about through a campaign by the communities.

Esquesing's curl reply will say they do not approve the question to be put to ballot even if council members feet the provincial government should assume full education costs.

"I don't think a ballot is the right way of going about it." Reeve George Leslie comment-

"It's asking for the impossible to ask the province to bear 100. per cent of the cost," said Jeputy reeve George Currie.
