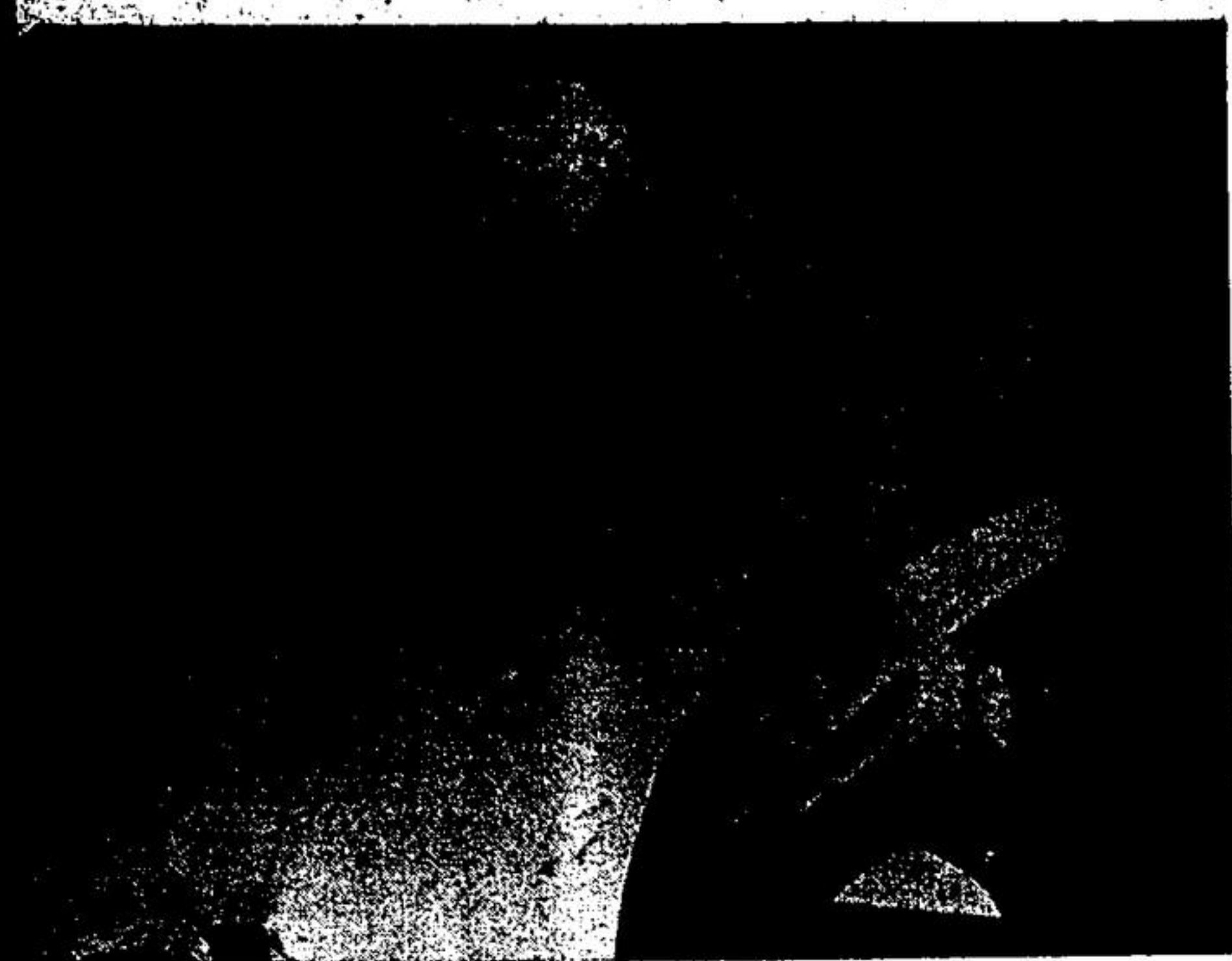


Comes from England for Granddaughter's Wedding

HARLEY TO HALTON

Weekly Observations by Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. for Halton

SINCE OUR last column the Budget debate has concluded with the Government surviving relatively easily three further votes of non-confidence. The Government has tabled a list of the measures it would like to deal with prior to Christmas. To me the main items in the months ahead will be as follows:

- 1) Capital punishment will be voted on again -- I voted for the abolishment of capital punishment last vote and expect to do so again.
- 2) Broadcasting Act to re-organize the Canadian Broadcasting Company and to perhaps change some policies in reference to broadcasting.
- 3) Amendments to Customs Tariffs growing out of the Kennedy Round of Tariff negotiations recently concluded.
- 4) The establishment of a Department of Corporate and Consumer Affairs under the Registrar-General to deal with all consumer affairs such as drug costs.
- 5) A Bill to amend the Patent Act and the Trade Marks Act which will implement, in all probability, the recommendations of the Committee I chaired to lower the cost of drugs.
- 6) A Bill to amend the Post Office Act to increase postal rates generally and reduce post office deficit.
- 7) A bill to change Canada's divorce laws, expected to liberalize grounds for divorce in Canada.
- 8) A Bill to outlaw hate literature.
- 9) A Bill to prohibit the sale and advertising of hazardous substances.
- 10) A Bill to establish the long-debated, long-awaited Canada Development Corporation designed to encourage Canadians to invest in Canada.

IT IS OBVIOUS that the list is long (I have not included them all) and the time is short. We hope it will be possible to deal with most of them.
