by THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN to Dispense with a Vote of the Electors

TAKE NOTICE THAT: 1. The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval to improve, pave and reconstruct certain roads in the Town of Georgetown at an estimated cost of \$352,500, of which approximately \$171,500 will be paid by way of subsidy from the Department of Highways and the balance of which, that is to say \$181,000, shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable out of the general rate over a period not exceeding twenty years.

2. The following are the roads, which are intended to be improved, paved and reconstructed:

Rexway Drive from one hundred feet west of Highway No. 7 to Delrex Blvd. Campbell Gate from Mountainview Road to Prince Charles Drive. Ewing Street from forty feet east of Main Street to Elm Street.

Hewson Crescent from Ewing Street to Ewing Street. Elizabeth Street from Ewing Street to Hewson Crescent. King Street from one hundred and nine feet north-west of Mountainview Rd. to Sarah Street.

Sarah Street from King Street to five hundred and fifty feet southwest of King Street.

Parkview Blvd. from Maple Avenue to six hundred and eighty feet north of Maple Avenue.

Joseph Street from Parkview Blvd. to Charles Street. Orchard Blvd. north from Joseph Street two hundred and forty feet.

Orchard Blvd. south from Joseph Street two hundred and twenty-five feet.

3. Application will be made to The Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works. Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the Town of Georgetown at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objections to such approval and the grounds of such objection.

4. The Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.
