#### Halton's population rose by 6.05 per cent to a new high of 151,167 figures released this week from County Assessor Robert Beach's office indicates.

The actual increase was \$.167 residents. Burlington had the largest increase with 6,336 new residents for a total of 71,781.

Oakville was second with an increase of 1,207 to 54,733. Acton's population rose 66 to 4,230. Georgetown increased 968 to 12,623.

Milton saw the lowest increase of any municipality, with 50 new residents to make a total of 0,870. Esquesing rose by 435 to 8,073 and Nassaurreys had a jump of 90 to 2,894.

Halton's population has more than doubled in the past years. It was just over 68,000 in 1987.


