

## Saturday A.M. Leagues Have Nineteen Rules to Abide By

Players and all concerned with Legion Minor Hockey must abide by the following rules this season.

- 1) The hockey is not to interfere with the Sunday or day school activities.
- 2) No member of the executive may coach only in case of an emergency.
- 3) No father shall be allowed to coach his own son, or to be in the players' box.
- 4) If a boy misses three consecutive weeks, he will be put on a waiting list unless he has good reason for not attending. Coach and manager are responsible for attendance records to be available to commissioner in each league.
- 5) A boy must be signed by Nov. 25th, unless he has a good reason for not doing so. If not then he will be put on a waiting list.
- 6) No one member of the executive commissioners, managers or coaches may suspend a player for infraction or misconduct of the rules.
- 7) The coach must give equal playing time to each player regardless of his playing ability, playoffs excepted.
- 8) The following will be dealt with by the executive: (a) any boy using profane language in or around the arena, (b) any boy using profane language directly to or directed at any official, coach manager or executive.
- 9) A commissioner and any 2 members of the executive may suspend any player for infractions of the rules until it is dealt with by the executive.
- 10) All players must report to their coach at least 15 minutes before game time or the coach can refuse to dress him for that game. Coaches are expected to be on time.
- 11) At the referee's discretion he is allowed to dispose of any hockey stick that is broken, chipped, or considered dangerous to the players.
- 12) Coaches and managers are responsible for the signing of sweaters and are expected to look after any equipment in their possession.
- 13) Coaches and managers that have any complaints must take them to the commissioner and the commissioner is responsible to the executive.
- 14) Any player suspended in either or all-star hockey cannot participate in either group until he is dealt with.
- 15) Players will not wear skates in the seating area. Any infraction will be a one game suspension. Coaches and managers are asked to co-operate.
- 16) It is your arena — treat it like home or you will be sent home.
- 17) Coaches and managers are responsible for keeping their players under control.
- 18) All players are required to wear head helmets and skate guards. Goalkeeper must wear a mask.
- 19) Insurance is compulsory prior to participation in Legion hockey.
