## Would Have Federal Government Authority in Highway Safety

The Federal Government should be prepared to act boldly in the field of automobile safety, Dr. Harry Harley, MP for Halton said this week.

He was commenting on a statement by Transport Minister Paul Hellyer in the Commons Tuesday that the federal department would take over responsibility for leadership in the field of motor vehicle and highway safety.

In his statement, Mr. Hellyer was cautious and made it clear that in carrying out any program attention would be given to the responsibilities of the different levels of government in this field of activity.

Dr. Harley said that in his view the federal government must assume the primary responsibility as autos travelled freely throughout Canada and had no respect for provincial boundaries.

"In the field of education we have not been able to establish uniform standards because of the provincial authority in this field. But in a matter like auto safety, I feel there should be national standards...that apply in all provinces," the Halton MP stated.

He also feels that Canada and the United States must work out safety standards for autos on a co-operative basis.

"With the auto pact in effect, there is complete reciprocity in the movement of autos back and forth from the manufacturing plants in both countries. It makes no sense to have one set of standards for Canada and another for the United States market. The two countries should get together and agree on one set of standards," the Oakville MP said.

He said he is not too sure about the practicality of having government inspectors in the auto plants to check on quality control procedures.

While the idea might be worth looking at, he wondered if it was practical, especially in view of the fact that many of the cars bought in Canada were being manufactured in the U.S., necessitating Canadian inspectors in U.S. plants if the scheme was to be 100 per cent effective.

## Life In Trinidad Described To Limehouse Thankoffering

Mrs. A. W. Benton introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Harold Mahatoo of Guelph, who teaches at Brookville. He told of the geographical, historical educational and religious set up of the densely populated, but economically progressive island of Trinidad. Born and educated there, he is descended from East Indian parentage which nationally shares the large percentage of population with the African negroes descendants.

The majority of negroes are Roman Catholic, while the later generations of East Indians are chiefly Presbyterian or United Church of Canada. In spite of crowded and poorly equipped schools some very clever students have gone out to further education. Prior to 1962 the chief goal was college in Great Britain, but since independence Canada is attractive. They are very grateful for the great help, extended through the years by Canada, especially the Presbyterian Church missions.

Since immigrating here he has become a Canadian citizen and he has been well treated and is ready to thank Canada publicly at any time. As a tourist attraction he told of the tropical growth, very good beaches, the asphalt lake and the scant danger of severe hurricanes.

Mr. Mahatoo showed numerous clear slides, assisted by his brother-in-law, of their native land and of his wife and family.
