"A new wing be erected for domiciliary veterans at Sunnyvale, part of Sunnybrook Hospital so as to help this classification of veterans in all areas."

 The names of Bursary winners in the District was disclosed. Five young people were awarded \$500 each and two received \$200 each. There were two hundred applications in District 'B'. In the whole of the province, the Legion awards \$29,700 a year in bursaries. We

July 31st is the deadline and application forms may be picked up at the high school. 'B' has raised 63 per cent of its Centennial Fund. The remainder must be raised before the end of the year.
