



CHRISTMAS CARD PURCHASE AIDS UNICEF

MRS. A. L. WARD, 8 Halc Dr., chairman of the UNICEF campaign in town has Mayor Joseph Gibbons as her first customer for UNICEF Christmas cards. The cards went on sale last week at the Y office in the Cedarvale building which is doubling as UNICEF headquarters. A UNICEF brochure says an order of five boxes of cards provides enough money for vaccine to protect 240 children against tuberculosis; ten boxes will stock three village fish ponds for local supply of valuable proteins; fifteen boxes will provide enough drugs to treat 12 leprosy cases for three years; five boxes will furnish 188 cakes of soap for a mother-and-child health centre; and twenty boxes will make available garden fool kits for the nutritional programs of three schools.

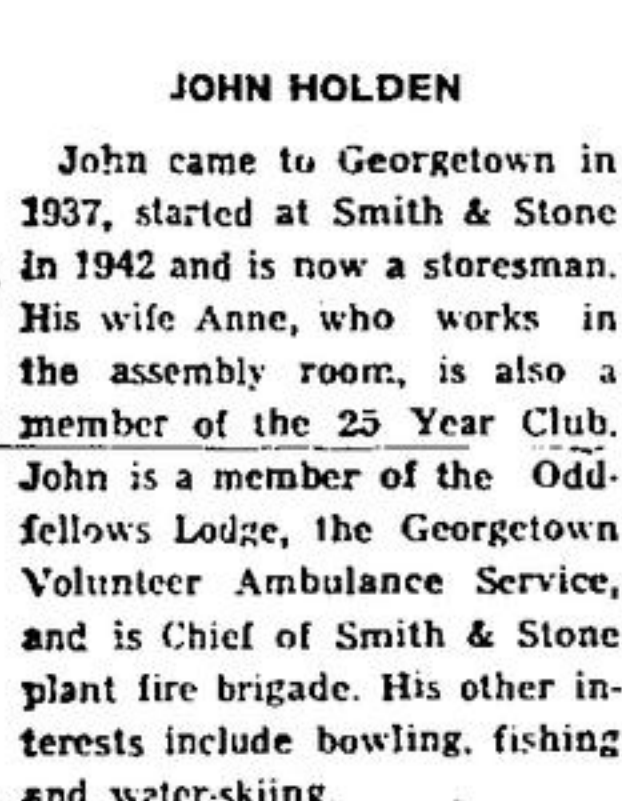
Four Join 25 Year Club For Smith & Stone, Plax

Seek Extra Blood Donors Among Newer Residents

Believing that many new residents in the east and west subdivisions will be interested, the Red Cross is conducting a canvass for new blood donors next Monday evening.

Members of Youth-In, Candy-stripers, Rangers and other organizations have volunteered to call at new homes with the Red Cross story that night.

Why be a blood donor?

Because — through voluntary donors, Red Cross supplies free blood to patients in any Canadian hospital. Blood cannot be manufactured, it must come from people.

Because — you and your family may be the very ones who benefit from this free service if you need it.

Because — adequate supplies can only be maintained if one unit of blood is collected every 15 seconds, every working day in Canada.

Because — there is no discomfort to you, everything is under professional supervision. You give only one-twentieth of average body content. This is replaced within 24 hours.

Because — it only takes 30 minutes of your time from start to finish, actual giving of your blood takes only 4 or 5 minutes.

Dense Fog Yesterday No Accidents Occur

At press time Georgetown police reported no motor vehicle accidents within town limits as the result of a dense fog which blanketed the area yesterday. However two collisions were investigated here Friday, one during the noon hour and the other at midnight.

The first occurred at the Georgetown Plaza and resulted in an injury to a motorcycleist, Steve Ewing of Weber Drive. Police said the motorcycle collided with a late model car operated by Raymond Addy of Glen Williams. Police estimated property damage at \$30. Ewing was treated for a badly bruised right leg.

At midnight, a car operated by Eric Oliver Edie of R. R. 2, Georgetown, and another driven by Thomas K. Gould of Norval collided on Maple Ave. opposite Maple Ave. Baptist Church resulting in \$1050 damage to the cars involved. Another \$120 damage was done to the church lawn when the Edie car left the road.
