Teach Hockey Rudiments To 100 Hopeful Tykes

It will be Montreal vs. Boston New York vs. Detroit and Toronto vs. Chicago when the smallest of the hockey small fry stride into the 1967-68 Tyke season tomorrow.

Close to a hundred youngsters ranging from eight years of age and down are involved in the Tyke setup which differs from the league for older players in that it airs some on-the-ice instruction in with the play.

Tykes have the Memorial Arena ice every Friday from 5 until 6:30 p.m. The hour and half is split into three 40 minute sessions and in each session the teams scheduled to play get 15 to 20 minutes of skating help followed by a game which lasts the remaining time.

Giving each player his equal share of playing time and keeping the teams as well balanced as possible are major aims of the league officials who do triple duty as executive, coaches and referees depending where they

are needed on any given week.

Shel Lawr heads the band of volunteers which also include Norm Long, Don Norton, Ron Dixon, Bob Tost and Norm's son Dave. Ian Long, Murray Stamp and George Poulsen help out by handling some of the teams in the player's boxes, and even Norm's wife Doreen makes a contribution by acting as treasurer.

Later in the year an all-star team is selected for tournament play. Chief coach Bob Tost and Dave Long take a personal interest in this part of the operation and accompany the chosen stars when they make their out of town jaunts.

"Lots of Hustle" in C&V Pee Wee Roster

Georgetown's C & V PeeWee hockey team starts the 1967-68 season tomorrow night with a new coach and manager and practically a new player roster.

Just three of last year's personnel are included in the new look outfit, a small fast-acting club with lots of hustle.

With 45 players trying out it has taken longer than usual to whittle the number to size.

Jack Gudgeon Jr. is the new coach who takes to his job the experience gained in three years with Brampton Seven-Ups in the Metro Junior B League, and prior to that many years of playing through the ranks of the Georgetown Legion minor hockey and all-star Support Group teams.

This is Jack's first year at coaching but not his first in handling young boys since he is in his second year of teaching school at Malton where he looks after physical education instruction.

Jack Gudgeon Sr. ends a three year absence from the local hockey picture in his new position as C & V's manager. He started coaching and managing in Legion minors in 1963 and worked behind the hockey benches until 1964. His charges

ranged from Novice to Juvenile and he was the man at the helm when the Georgetown PeeWees competed at Goderich for the first time.

Jack's son-in-law, Dave MacKenzie is assistant manager. He too played in the local minor setup, at Appleby College and finished his hockey at the University of Western Ontario. Dave and Jack Jr. were team-mates on that first Georgetown Pee Wee team in the Goderich tourney.

The team's trainer and equipment manager is Jim Atkinson who played minor hockey here and is teaching public school in Georgetown.

One of the returnees is goalie Brian Laird, who looks real sharp with one year under his belt. Also working in the net, and a pleasant surprise is David Gleave, a new boy in town who played in the THL last year.

In the blue line corps are Jack McFarlane, one of the biggest boys on the team, Barry James, a rushing defenceman back from last year, Tom Fendley a solid type who makes few mistakes and hits well, and Larry Petterson, a take charge rearguard who controls the play when he's on the ice.

Up front are Craig Fleming, also a second year PeeWee who is expected to be one of the team's big scorers. Gary McFadyen, always dangerous around the net, and Brad Edgar, one of the small players who makes up for it with extra hustle. Rod Beaumont is a shifty centre who will set up a lot of goals this season and won't get pushed around by the opposition. Rick Becker is another of the team's little men, but only in stature. His go-go style erases anything he gives away in height. Ted Kewley is expected to produce a good share of the goal scoring and looks sharp in pre-season going.

Bernie Hachman has a real good shot and can score from all angles. Gary Mix is a work horse, goes full out all the time and provides the spark element. Bill Fregrove is the team's skater and will be valuable in contributing speed up front as well as killing penalties.

The C & V PeeWees have had bad luck in exhibition games losing four starts but people close to the team expect it to start the schedule with a win in Preston tomorrow (Friday) night, and have a contending position by Christmas.

They play their home games Tuesday nights at 8 o'clock and

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guarantee spectators an hour of good exciting hockey.
