

Sacrifice, Be Prophets, Advice To High School Graduating Class

Be old fashioned in your attitude towards excellence; be alert and ready for change; be ahead of the times in ideas.

This was the advice to the graduating class of Georgetown District High School on Friday, from Dr. Finlay Stewart, a Kitchener minister and past moderator of the Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Stewart spoke to graduates, their parents and friends at the commencement exercises. He said many young people today are playing with life in radical groups while the world demands sacrifices from people in countries such as ours, to solve world problems of race relations and ideological differences.

Young people today enter the world of the computer, he said where knowledge can be retrieved by the touch of a finger.

This leaves man to become a prophet. The machine supplies the information, and it is man's job to relate this to the future.

This is the heart of what we are calling progressive education, he said, to learn with initiative and imagination, to reach our goal of peace and racial happiness.

Principal Donald Turner dealt more specifically with changing educational methods in his remarks.

From a rigid system up to 1926, gradual changes began, he said, and in the forties district high schools began replacing the smaller schools. Today we have specialized schools with bus transportation all over the province. The school of the future, he said, could well be a large building with partitions adjusted to changing needs.

Courses today are varied, and

in future years present courses of study will be replaced by an option system, he predicted. Increasing use of audio tapes and television will be made and the examination system will be much more flexible.

Valedictorian Roger Smith used "student responsibility" as the theme for his speech.

He criticized the present school system as requiring too heavy a burden of administration on school heads. This should be relegated to others, as is done in universities, he said, allowing school officials more time for consideration of student affairs.

A majority of students are apathetic and lack school spirit, he said. They lack organization and leadership. There is no organized program to initiate incoming Grade nines into high school life and create this spirit, he said. He blamed the failure of a student newspaper last year on "unfair and unjust censorship."

"Student responsibility includes a good performance in the classroom," he concluded, ending with a tribute to the teaching staff.

"When it comes time to evaluate the debt incurred on both sides, the scales are weighted heavily in my favour and I thank you sincerely," he said, in accepting a special prize award from the GDHS staff.

Forty-six Grade 13 graduates received their honour diplomas at the commencement; 74 Grade 12 students in the 5-year program received graduation diplomas, as well as 75 in the 4-year program and 9 in the special commercial course. Certificates of training were awarded 22 students in the two-year occupational course.
