Even in the centre of Delhl slum dwellers still tour the streets collecting cow manure for use as fuel.

"We are doing everything we can to popularize coal, but it is hard work," a spokesman for the ministry of steel, mines and metals said. "People have been usin: cow dung for so long that they see no reason why they abould give up this free product

and pay for coal." India produced 70,000,000 tons of coal in 1966 but home consumption amounted to less than 15 per cent. The remainder was used by industry and the railways. Coal reserves total 120,-000,000,000 tons.
