Junior Raiders Boast 6.3 Average, League's Highest

Georgetown Raiders jolted Streetsville 9-1 in Georgetown Memorial Arena, Sunday to end that new Central Junior C entry's short unbeaten streak. Streetsville had downed Milton Merchants 4-1 and Oakville Blades 7-5 before meeting Raiders.

The Georgetown output brought their goal production over the last two games to 18. Their goals per game average 6.3 and is highest in the league, but Raiders brass aren't resting on the statistics. A team spokesman said this week they're negotiating to add another high scoring forward to the lineup.

Fred Cowbrough worked in the Georgetown net and while he handled just ten Streetsville shots he has apparently impressed Raiders officials sufficiently to earn the goaltending job.

Cowbrough played solidly against Milton Merchants, October 29th, and in relief of Brian Peavoy October 27th.

Raiders rocked Streetsville with three goals in a span of a minute and six seconds in the first period. Terry Hay started it from Terry Leawick at 12:38. Paul Robinson scored on the heels of that one from Ron Lane, and Leswick counted his second from Doug Malcolm and Jack Kemshead at 13:32.
