Martin House, Halton's new home for the aged adjacent to the Halton Centennial Manor on Ontario St., Milton, will be formally opened at a ceremony there today.

The Department of Social & Family Services' Director of the homes for the aged branch Noble Drew will share the official opening and ribbon cutting ceremonies with Halton's 1967 Warden William Coulter of Nassagaweya and Simon Henry Baverstock who is 101 and the Manor's oldest resident.

Martin House is named to commemorate the Martin family which founded the mill around which Milton was built, and Dr. C. A. Martin who is a past county warden and municipal official in Milton.

Withdraw Charge of Wounding Farm Dog

A Weston man pleaded not guilty in magistrate's court on Monday of allegedly wounding a dog kept by its R. R. 3, Georgetown owner for a lawful purpose.

On December 17th Milton will be added to Georgetown's free calling area with no increase in rates in Georgetown subscribers. Milton subscribers will pay the tab since the addition will take them to a new rate level.

The expansion will increase the number of telephones from 5500 to 62,000 available at local rates to Milton subscribers. They will also be able to reach Oakville and Burlington subscribers without going long distance.

There will still be long distance charges for such inter-exchange calls as Georgetown to Oakville, or Oakville to Burlington.

With the addition of Milton to the Georgetown free call area it will bring to six the number of surrounding exchanges Georgetown telephone users can reach without long distance charge. Acton, Brampton, Huttonville, Snelgrove and Victoria were included in Georgetown's free call area a few years ago.

Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon would not accept the testimony of the dog's owner, because he had not seen the incident. He said his children had been walking the dog when it was shot.

Magistrate Langdon allowed Crown Attorney Herbert Freshman to withdraw the charge, cautioning the accused that the Crown has the right to bring another charge against him.

The accused owns an Esquimaux Township farm on which some sheep were killed by a pack of dogs recently.

Coming New Member Of Cedarvale Board

Frank Corning, a teacher at Georgetown District high school was appointed a member of Cedarvale Community Centre board by council at Monday's meeting.

Mr. Corning, replaces Chris Walker, who resigned the position recently.

The board administers the former Cedarvale Girls School property which was acquired as Georgetown's centennial project.

He said he was told at the time by Provincial Police Officers that he is entitled to shoot dogs molesting his sheep.

When the dog was shot it was running in the same field where the accused had kept his sheep before they were killed.

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William McKinnon 82 was Lifelong District Resident

William James McKinnon, 82, a man who had lived almost his entire life in Georgetown and Glen Williams, died in his sleep early Saturday morning, October 28th. He had enjoyed excellent health, and passed away as the result of a coronary, during the night.

Mr. McKinnon had worked in the old lower paper mill for many years as a young man, and had been a bread salesman for a local bakery, and later for Canada Bread for some years. He had worked at the Beaumont Woollen Mills until his retirement a few years ago.

An Anglican, he had been a faithful adherent of St. George's. He had been an active Organistman all his life.

Mr. McKinnon has one surviving brother, Johnson McKinnon, of Calgary, Alberta. He was predeceased by three sisters, Mrs. William Davison, Glen Williams, Mrs. C. Willett, of Stewarttown and Mrs. Mark Clark, of Georgetown. He was predeceased by two brothers, Neil and John.

The funeral was held from the McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Georgetown, on Monday afternoon, October 30. Father Eric Mills of St. George's Anglican Church was the minister.

Palbearers were Bill Clark, Les Clark, Floyd Ward, Lloyd Davison, Bill Korzack, and Herb Robinson. Interment was in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery.

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
