

Sophisticated Comedy by Little Theatre Group

A sophisticated switch on the eternal triangle, "Marriage-Go-Round" is the season's opener for the Georgetown Little Theatre, November 9, 10 and 11, in the high school auditorium.

Presented as an illustrated lecture on the perils of monog-

amy, it is delivered alternately by a professor of cultural anthropology, Ron Hill, and his wife, Dean of Women, played by Freda Griltani.

Holy Cross Pupils Share Their Hallowe'en Goodies

A hundred and twenty pounds of Hallowe'en treats were dispatched from Georgetown Tuesday morning, bound for Indians in the White River district of Northern Ontario. The belated shell-out will come about thanks to the generosity of Holy Cross Separate School pupils who last week brought bags of surplus candies to school in response to a suggestion by one of their mates Peter Hurley.

Peter told principal Richard C. Perrott he felt most children collected more candies Hallowe'en night than they can eat and offered to donate his extra to Northern Ontario Indians. Mr. Perrott relayed Peter's offer over the public address system and the result was similar contributions from pupils of all ages.

The candies were sent to Father Brennan, a Jesuit priest at White River. Father Brennan, another priest and a lay

brother assist the Indians in the White River district, known as Ontario's perennial cold spot. They travel two hundred miles weekly aiding the residents, many of which live year round in tents, spiritually and physically.

A lot of Holy Cross parents have since followed their children's lead and asked if the

Northern Ontario Indians could also stand some used clothing. As a result a clothing drive will be held at the end of the month. Mr. Perrott collected 20 cartons of clothing for the Indians, while teaching in St. Catharines last year. A few years back he taught at an Indian mission on Manitoulin Island.

Cairn Mounted Bell Recalls Old Schoolhouse

"Designed and constructed in memory of Austin A. Corner 1904 - 1966" Stewarttown School Bell S. S. No. 6 1873 - 1958 erected by the Esquusing Women's Institute to commemorate Canada's Centennial 1967

It was unveiled by Mrs. Walter Lawson, a former teacher, and Mrs. Harry McMillan, Mr. Corner's daughter.

The Rev. Canon J. E. It represented a way of life, and giving the Old Bell a place of honour was a tribute to our heritage and a fitting manner by which to mark our Canadian Centennial year.
