Engineer Salary Too High Says Opposing Councillor

10 Shelley Street, November 7th, 1967. Sir: It is a rare occasion indeed when I find it necessary to file to you and the taxpayers through your newspaper to complain of an unjust move made by Municipal Council of which I am a member.

At the regular council meeting held Monday night, eight members of council voted to raise the salaries of a Town Engineer at the annual salary of \$4,200, including car allowance, which is an increase of most \$5,000, over what we are paying our former Engineer.

Now, I know nothing about a man other than that he is present working for a Town near North Bay and has received satisfactory as a rural engineer with some urban experience and as a matter of fact, this is about all any member of Council knows, so certainly to all intents and purposes he is somewhat of an unknown quantity, and in my opinion he should start his employment with Georgetown at a lesser salary until such time that he has proved to council that he is indeed worth a kind of money.

In checking the salaries paid to Engineers all through this and other Councils around Georgetown, and the salaries paid to Engineers with equivalent positions with the Department of Highways, I have learned that this salary is a good deal higher, and I consider it most fair to expect our taxpayers accept this additional cost, particularly when all members council have stated on many occasions that they will always give for full value for every dollar spent, and that they do not spend money unwisely. It might be of further interest to you Mr. Editor to know that

we have many Engineers living in Georgetown at the moment, and some of them have indicated to me that this \$4,200 salary is too high for a municipality of this size, and had they known that this would be the range for this position they would have most certainly applied for the job.

This would appear to me Mr. Editor that Council is getting a little lackadaisical in its spending of our tax dollar, maybe this is because of the two year term, or maybe it's because the taxpayers are getting complacent with their elected representatives, neither of which is a desirable situation.

My purpose in writing this letter to you Mr. Editor, is to determine whether or not this is the case or are all the taxpayers making so much money that a few thousand dollars of their taxes spent unwisely here and there is of no concern to them. I sincerely hope that you and members of council will hear from the taxpayers in this matter in the very near future.
