Arrest Two Following Fire At Belfountain

Provincial police have arrested two men and are questioning two girls in connection with a \$5,000 cottage blaze in Belfountain in the early hours of Saturday.

Police have charged a Caledon and Orangeville youth with breaking and entering and arson.

Two Grand Valley girls, aged 17 and 18, have been questioned and police say charges are pending. Their names are being withheld at present.

The charges follow a blaze in an unoccupied summer cottage in Belfountain shortly after 12:30 a.m. Saturday and a high speed car chase from Belfountain to Grand Valley.

The fire at the cottage, owned by Mrs. Elizabeth Alice of Toronto, was spotted when a neighbour, Ross Terrell heard a screeching car, voices and smashing glass outside the Alice property.

His brother-in-law, James Weir, also of Belfountain saw flames and alerted Alton police.

Information concerning the car and the description of the driver led to a province-wide alert through Brampton OPP detachment.

Shortly afterwards an Orangeville OPP officer gave chase to two cars racing at 85 mph on the highway from Belfountain to Grand Valley.

During the chase the alert for the wanted car and driver came over the radio. "I realized one of the cars answered the description so I kept close behind until both cars stopped in Grand Valley," Constable Patrick Conings said.

The driver of one of the cars later said he had nearly been knocked off the road by the first car and gave chase.
