"During wartime, sewing was primarily done for armed forces, but in peacetime it is done to help disaster victims all over the world," she said.

This year there was a request for clothes for victims of Viet Nam and the war in the middle East, so the demand at present is for tropical clothing.

"For a start we have placed an order for two piece summer dresses, sleeveless dresses and shorts," said Mrs. Sutherland. "We also included a small order for layettes. These come cut out with sewing instructions, materials, thread, buttons, etc., supplied."

The Georgetown branch is required to return the finished articles by June, 1968, however they would like these completed as early in the year as possible so they can prepare them for shipment.

"We urgently need people to sew for this program and any person or group willing to volunteer would be much appreciated," Mrs. Sutherland said.


