Over \$5,000 Damage in District Auto Accidents

Damage to automobiles involved in accidents in the Georgetown vicinity so far this month has already topped the \$5,000 mark according to North Halton OPP detachment.

Over \$3,000 damage was done Saturday afternoon when cars operated by Starrett Leslie, R R 4, Georgetown, and Christopher Gauthier of Port Credit collided on the 9th Line of Esquesing north of Glen Williams.

Damage was over \$1,500 when a car operated by Howard Miller of Downsview hit a parked car on No. 7 highway at Norval earlier the same day. Miller was admitted to Georgetown hospital with cuts to his mouth and a possible broken arm.

Friday afternoon, a car driven by William John Ferguson, R R 3, Brampton, left the road at the 10th Line - No. 7 sidewalk corner near Georgetown Golf and Country Club resulting in \$500 damage.

Matys to Help Set Up Ghana Education System

A former member of the staff at Georgetown District high school has been chosen to help set up a new school system in Ghana.

George Matys, guidance director for St. Catharines R.C. Separate School board, is the youngest of six men who will study the country's education and economics system for a year, then work out plans for a renovated school system.

His wife and two sons will accompany him for a minimum two-year stint in West Africa.

Presently Ghana has a system modelled on that of Britain. Only about 7,000 of the nation's 262,000 students are in commercial or technical schools. There are only eleven technical schools, while 190 prepare students for university or teaching.

Mr. Matys taught math, history and guidance in Georgetown. He left to take a position in a private school in 1963, and later became a guidance head in St. Catharines.

Early Christmas If You're Mailing British Parcels

Christmas is still over six weeks away, but if you are planning on sending a parcel to Britain for instance you had better have your Christmas shopping completed and gifts mailed before November 21. So says a schedule of mailing deadline dates obtained from the post office by the Herald this week.

If you were thinking of sending a Christmas parcel to Australia, India or other trans-Pacific or Trans-Atlantic places, chances are you are already past the surface mail deadline, but can still make it in time via air mail.

Additional time and effort should be spent on Christmas mail preparation so that parcels containing gift and greetings will be received in good condition and on time for Christmas.

Postmaster Marshall offered this reminder for card senders. Cards go to any point in Canada, United States, its territories and possessions and other countries of North, Central and South America, the West Indies, and Spain for 3 cents. To all other countries 4 cents.

Propose Amalgamation of Acton Quarries and I.M.C.

A proposed amalgamation agreement between Industrial Minerals of Canada Limited and Acton Limestone Quarries Ltd. will be submitted for consideration and approval at shareholders meetings of the two companies on November 28. A.I.Q. is located on the 4th Line of Esquesing west of Limehouse.

Details of the proposal were outlined in a letter and information circular mailed to shareholders last week.

Under the agreement, Industrial Minerals would acquire the assets and business of Acton, subject to certain liabilities. Acton's operations would then be carried on as an integrated part of the amalgamated company, which would have the same capitalization and name as the present company, "Industrial Minerals of Canada Limited."

Both companies are controlled by Falconbridge Nickel Mines Ltd.

Acton, incorporated in 1962, is engaged in mining, processing and marketing of aggregates. Its large processing plant near Limehouse is capable of treating 800 tons of aggregates per hour. Other facilities are in Vaughan Township, Scarborough and Whitby, Ontario. The company has earned a significant share of the market in which it competes.

A practical and economic step in diversification, and has proposed the amalgamation to Falconbridge. As well as broadening its product line, it would offer new market opportunities in a field closely allied to Industrial Minerals' present sphere of operations and technical resources.

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
