Outshoot, Outscore Oaks For Fifth Raider Win

Firing two shots on goal for every one launched by Oakville, Blades, Georgetown Raiders rolled to their fifth straight win of the OHA Suburban Junior C hockey schedule here Sunday afternoon.
Raiders blasted home three first period goals, three in the second period and a couple in the final to crush the visitors 8-1.
Georgetown juniors have convincingly bounced Milton Merchants, Streetsville, Orangeville and Oakville twice, since stumbling in their opener in Milton October 27. Their 7 1/2 goals per game pace is hottest in the loop.
Part of Raiders success is due to the performance of their new crop. Four of Sunday's total were scored by hustlers wearing red and white this season for the first time.
In a typical Raider burst the locals rifled three goals in three minutes in the first period and ended that frame leading 3-1. Terry Hay triggered it at 12:29 scoring from Phil Lavell. Paul Robinson beat Oakville's Gobel 30 seconds later from Ron Lane and Bill Dwyer, and Lavell scored an unassisted goal at 15:30.
Oakville's sole goal came near the end of the period, Desmond the marksman from Gibson and O'Haherty.
Paul Robinson opened a 4-1 gap with seven minutes gone in the middle period, Lane and Dwyer assisting. Unassisted efforts by Dwyer at 13:55 and Terry Leswick at 16:32 paid off Raiders 5th and 6th goals of the afternoon.
The third period was the best one for the Oakville attack as they found the Raider target with 15 shots, but none of them hit the twine. Raiders responding to the new pressure surged back with 20 shots on the Blade cage.
Henry King, an elevated Juvenile scored his first goal as a Raider at 15:32 from Ron Lane, and Terry Leswick punched in number eight from Hay and John Quackenbush with two minutes left.
Georgetown threw 41 shots at the Blades goalie, G. Gobel and Oakville snipers tested Raider's Brian Peavoy 20 times.
There were 18 minor penalties, 12 of them in the chippy first period.

Chain Reaction Accident Involves Three Vehicles

Two possible whiplash cases were the only injuries resulting from five recent motor accidents in Georgetown.
Mr. and Mrs. Klaukals, of 34 John St. W., suffered the sore necks after their car was hit from behind in a three-car chain reaction accident on Guelph St. opposite Sacred Heart Church, Nov. 10th.
Police said Klaukals car was knocked forward into a stopped vehicle operated by Robert Hall of 16 Chevalier Dr. when bumped by a car driven by Paul Hodge of Acton. The Hall car was stopped on the hill waiting for a vehicle ahead to make a left turn according to police.
Investigating officer Cst. Kenneth Firth placed property damage at \$20 to Hall, \$75 to Klaukals and \$700 to Hodge. The accident happened at 5:20 p.m.
Earlier in the week two accidents within minutes and a few hundred yards of each other also involved similar circumstances. At 4:05 p.m. on Nov. 7 a truck registered to Brampton Transport being driven by William Vanslingerland of Streetsville turned on its side opposite 142 Maple Ave. W. after the driver steered to the shoulder to avoid hitting an oncoming vehicle. Cst. Robert Moy estimated damage at \$150.
Fifteen minutes later Thomas Kennedy of Toronto, driving west on Maple collided with a car driven by Harold Bailey of Georgetown. The Bailey car had been southbound on Charles St. and was stopped at the Maple corner when the accident occurred. Here too the accident resulted when Bailey veered to his right to avoid hitting an oncoming car.
Damage in this one also handled by Cst. Moy was \$225.
A Saturday evening smash at the Guelph - John St. corner did \$475 to cars operated by Lawrence Steenhuis, of RR 4, Georgetown, and Christian Hofing of RR 2, Brampton. Steenhuis was westbound on
