Was Union President At Domtar and Small Arms

strong labour man, who ad been president of union locals at Domtar Pulp & Paper and the Small Arms plant, William Francis Engleby, 79, died on November 6 at Halton Centennial Manor.

Mr. Engleby organized the union at the Long Branch plant and served as its president when he was employed there during the war years. He had also been president of Local 474 during his employment with Domtar, where he worked from 1946 until he retired in 1952.

Born in Belmont, Durham County, England, be was the son of William Engleby and Mary Francis and attended school at Sholten and Broomside public schools. He was a coal miner until 1929, then farmed in Wales for two years.

He came to Canada in 1931 farmed at Cochrane, and after moving to Georgetown in 1938 he was employed with Georgetown Clay Products and later at the Small Arms and Domtar
