A graduate in civil engineering from the University of Toronto, he was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Petch, 30 Chapel Street E. and spent his boyhood on their farm at Union where he attended S. S. 3, Chinguacousy. His parents moved to Georgetown, and he completed his high school education here.

He worked for some years with Canadian Fire Underwriters in Montreal, and had held his present position in the city for the past seven years, while making his home in Brampton.

He was a member of Augsburg Lutheran Church and of the Brampton Kinsmen Club.

He leaves his wife, Thelma MacDonald, three children, Carol, Ralph and Marsha; and his parents here.

Planned Apartment Is Opposed by 31

A Planning Board recommendation to rezone, to allow construction of an 8-suite apartment building on Cherry Street is being opposed by a group of district residents.

Solicitor Water Sopinka, presenting a petition to council Monday signed by 31 people, pointed out their objections. He said two houses on the street could be depreciated, cited traffic hazards to children, and said that in turning down an application in another part of town, the board said a new official plan is in process and a decision would not be made until this is finalized.

A resident, Bruce Harley, also spoke against the apartment, and said it would be discrimination if land is rezoned here when apartments are not allowed in the park area.

He said a partly completed house on the street should be finished before any more building is considered, and also mentioned adding to traffic hazards on an already busy street.

Council did not discuss this further at the meeting, but did endorse a Planning Board recommendation which turned down a request from Alcan Homes to rezone a portion of land in the east end from R1 to R2.

The Cubs enjoyed hot chocolate in Holy Cross Church basement afterwards.

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
