In view of the recent controversy over responsible students and responsible newspapers, a group of local students has deemed it necessary for positive steps to be taken with respect to these questions.

While Students for Responsible Action recognizes the tasks which Youth-In is performing as valuable to local teens, it is not affiliated with that organization. The chief aim of S.R.A. is to provide the youth of Georgetown, and the adults also with insights into local affairs primarily, and then into the many other facets of life in this complex society.

In order to achieve this goal, S.R.A. has created Issues Magazine, which will make its debut on January 5, 1968.

The purpose of this tabloid is to enlighten the citizens of this town and to bring to them the issues of the day in a readable format based on Time magazine. Certainly there will be pointed views and intelligent, constructive criticism the reason being that issues will not be censored at every corner by a super-stereile administrative bureaucracy.

However, this does not mean that S.R.A. is publishing an underground rag. It simply means that local youth has finally found a voice which will, hopefully, be called "responsible" by a critical adult community.

In the final analysis, S.R.A. hopes to show local adults that students do have enough responsibility to choose for themselves what should, and what should not be said. Extend Bridge Completion Deadline an Extra Month

County council, last week, granted an extension on the first phase of the building of the new Glen Williams bridge, walk, levelling, trimming, seeding, sodding, paving, etc. will start May 1st and finished in December 1968.

Reeve W. Hunter of Georgetown explained the extension was given because of the very rainy fall which held up construction. He also stated that this is only the second bridge of this type in Ontario. It features a new system of stressing without bottom supports for the ice to jam under.

This phase will complete the structure to the point where it can be opened for traffic. All operations will cease for the winter, as soon as the bridge has been opened, and the falsework and detour removed.

Rev. J. L. McBride Was Pastor At Holy Cross

A former pastor of Holy Cross R.C. Church, Rev. James Leo McBride, 75, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, on November 21.

Father McBride was born in Hamilton and received his early education at St. Lawrence's School. He later studied in Toronto taking philosophy at St. Michael's College and theology at St. Augustine's Seminary.

In 1921, he was ordained and became assistant at St. Mary's Church and St. Augustine's, Dundas. Eight years later, he was appointed pastor of Holy Cross, Georgetown and St. Joseph's, Acton making his home in Acton as was customary when the two churches were combined as one parish.

He retired last June as pastor of Sacred Heart and St. Lawrence's Churches in Hamilton.

He leaves two sisters, Miss Mary McBride and Mrs. J.L. Aitough, both of Brampton and a brother Frank of Toronto.

Pontifical mass was celebrated on Thursday in St. Lawrence's Church and burial was in Holy Cross Sepulchre Cemetery.
