**Tanhardt - Bred Kanaka Valuable O.P.P. Member**

A German Shepherd from Miss Laura Treble's Tanhardt Kennels, R.R. 1, Georgetown, is making a name for himself with Ontario Provincial Police.

Kanaka, which began a police dog career when the OPP started using canines two years ago, has been employed in approximately 100 occurrences and demonstrations since then, and has been responsible for the arrest of escapees, the recovery of stolen property, tracking fugitives and even located a body missing for over five days.

The latter happened in the Sarnia area. Organized search parties had failed to turn up a clue. One area, because of its dense undergrowth, swampy terrain and infestation with insects was avoided. OPP Constable Boley and Kanaka were put on the case. They entered the region and thirty minutes later Kanaka had located the body.

Working on another case Kanaka was taken to the scene of a break and entry moments after it occurred. He picked up a trail at the rear of the Supermarket where the break-in took place, following it for 50 feet and sprung toward a clump of bushes, flushing out one of the robbers. The loot was recovered and an accomplice was later picked up.

Kanaka and Cst. Boley were commended for alert work on tracing two escapees from a reform institution. After tracking down the pair Kanaka's nose led him to a stolen purse and other stolen items which had been hidden.

Finding stolen goods and even beer and liquor dumped at roadside, as well as the owners, has become routine for the amazing member of the force.

Kanaka solved a mystery in another part of the province where two police officers had been killed by a sniper's bullets. Police ringed the house from which the shots had been fired and waited. Finally, after a lengthy siege, tear gas bombs were lobbed inside through a window, and police were puzzled when nobody fled. Cst. Boley opened a door and dispatched Kanaka. He found the sniper in a bedroom where he had killed himself.

In another instance Kanaka was taken to a nursing home from where an elderly resident had disappeared. He followed a trail from the back of the home to a pond about half a mile away. Later that day the body was recovered from the water.

Kanaka always accompanies Cst. Boley on his routine patrol and the pair are on-call for emergencies 24 hours a day. It's not uncommon for them to be involved in the investigation of several minor crimes in one week.

**Hydro Offers Safety Tips for Festive Season**

For most Canadian families the Yuletide season isn't complete without a Christmas tree well covered with attractive decorations and bright lights.

The tradition of illuminating Christmas trees dates back to Germany, over 450 years ago. The story goes that Martin Luther, while walking home one night, was so impressed with the bright twinkling stars, that he put candles on his Christmas tree to illustrate their splendor to his family.

Now electric lights have replaced the flickering candle flame, but decorated trees still must be properly cared for so they will not be a fire hazard. "Safety should be the foremost concern, when purchasing and installing your decorations this season," says Robert Price, electrical inspection superintendent in Ontario Hydro's Central Region.

To ensure a safe and happy holiday, unmarred by the dangers of fire, Mr. Price recommends the following Christmas safety suggestions:

- 1) When purchasing decorative lighting sets and electrical appliances be sure they bear the Canadian Standards Association seal of approval. The large "C" enclosing the letters "SA" means that your purchases have passed the severe approval tests of CSA which have been established for your protection.
- 2) Store the tree in a cool place until you put it up.
- 3) Keep it in a water-filled container.
- 4) Do not block an exit with the tree.
- 5) Make sure that all ornaments and things like cotton batting, placed at base of the tree, are fireproof and that circuits aren't overloaded with holiday lights.
- 6) Check both indoor and outdoor tree-lighting equipment for frayed wires, cracked or brittle insulation, broken lamp sockets or damaged plugs. Throw away
