

34.1% Chinguacousy Vote "Disgraceful" Says Reeve Clark

"A disgraceful turnout," said Reeve Cyril Clark of 34.1 per cent of Chinguacousy Township voters who exercised their right to elect four councillors in the Dec. 2 polling.

"Even worse," said the Reeve, "is the 23 per cent who turned out in Ward 4, Bramalea, to elect a public school board trustee."

Robert Tate, with 527 votes, re-elected to school board, received just over 14 per cent over the 3,650 total registered voters for the ward.

Lowest turnout, which helped to bring the township down to the 34.1 per cent average, was Bramalea's Ward 4, where only 1,005 voters out of 4,207 registered turned out to give a 23.9 per cent turnout.

(The difference in Ward 4 and school council voters and school board is the 577 Separate School supporters who vote for a councillor, but not the public school representative.)

Best return in the four-ward fight came from Luttwonville, where Mrs. Mae Dixon, and Al Ferri, sitting councillor in Ward 3, attracted 512 of the eligible 993 voters to the polls and gave the ward a respectable 51.3 per cent turnout.

In second place was Bramalea's Ward 5, in strict contrast to Ward 4's low, the three-way fight between Miller, Tindale and Wallace drew 44.5 per cent of the 1,297 registered voters to the polling stations.

Surprising figure in this contest was the low 65 voters polled by the NDP supported candidate Jim Tindale.

In the recent provincial election the NDP candidate Dr. George Hill polled higher than either of his two opponents in this area.

In Ward 2, Snelgrove and district 36.1 per cent of the 1,220 voters went to the polls to give Harold Wilson, sitting councillor victory in a two-way fight with Russell Collis.

Despite its very low percentage, Ward 4, in Bramalea provided the only excitement of the day with a very close battle between Dr. Robert Williams and Jim Yarrow, the former finally taking victory by 16 votes.

There will be no "first" for Chinguacousy Township council in the shape of a woman councillor this year.

Both Mrs. Gail Rotliers, in Ward 4, and Mrs. Mae Dixon, in Ward 3, were well beaten.

Officials at the polling stations reported a brief surge of voters shortly after the polls opened at 10 a.m. Saturday, but by noon it had dropped to a trickle.

"From 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., when the Grey Cup was on, we might as well have closed," said one poll clerk.

After 5 p.m. an estimated 40 per cent of all the voters attended the polls despite icy roads in the early evening that had cars skidding all over the highways.

All Breeds of County Dairy Cows Over Average

The purebred dairy cows in Halton excel the Canadian average in milk production for all breeds. The 78 herds of Holsteins enrolled on record of performance, with an average number of 26 records, had an average BCA of 120 for milk and 123 for fat. This is 5 BCA points above the Canadian average for milk, and plus 6 for fat. Our 16 herds of Jerseys averaging 38 records, and BCA's of 124 and 119. This is plus 12 and plus 10 of the Canadian average. The 7 Guernsey herds averaged 35 records, and had BCA's of 120 and 105, which are 5 and 3 points above.

Although we have only 2 Ayrshire herds on ROP, these herds with an average of 60 records were 35 and 29 points above the Canadian average

THE BARBERING INDUSTRY GEORGETOWN ZONE

WHEREAS the Minister of Labour has designated that part of Ontario described in Ontario Regulation 334/67 as the GEORGETOWN ZONE and as a zone for the BARBERING INDUSTRY which he has defined as all work done by barbers in:

(a) shaving or trimming a beard or moustache;

(b) cutting, trimming, singeing, shampooing or dressing hair;

(c) giving: — (i) facial massage, or (ii) scalp treatment;

and (d) honing or stropping a razor, except where performed in barber schools, licensed under The Apprenticeship and Tradesman's Qualification Act, 1964 and, has received a petition requesting a conference of the employers and employees in the said industry and has authorized the convening of such conference.

NOW THEREFORE TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to The Industrial Standards Act, R.S.O. 1960, Chapter 186 as amended, a conference of the employers and employees engaged in the said industry within the said zone is hereby summoned to meet at the Odd Fellows' Hall, Wesleyan Street, Georgetown, Ontario, on Thursday, December 14th, 1967, at the hour of 8:00 p.m. for the purpose of investigating and considering the conditions of labour and the practices prevailing in the said industry and for negotiating and submitting to the Minister of Labour a schedule of wages and hours and days of labour;

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the employers and employees who attend such conference are authorized and empowered by the Industrial Standards Act to negotiate a schedule and, upon the approval and recommendation of the Minister of Labour, The Lieutenant Governor in Council may declare that such schedule shall be binding upon all employers and employees in such industry which includes all persons, in any way engaged or employed in the work or operations included in such industry;
