UNICEF Hallowe'en Total \$670. for World's Needy

Again this year the UNICEF Hallowe'en collection went over the top. Total raised by the annual collection was tabulated this week when the last UNICEF boxes were turned in.

Each year the total has grown. This year the orange coloured boxes yielded \$670 to help feed the needy children all over the world.

Last year's total was \$634.

Since one cent provides six large glasses of milk, \$670 would provide 402,000 glasses of milk. On the same basis, Georgetown's contribution will protect 53,600 children against TB, cure 26,800 children of yaws, or treat 16,700 cases of leprosy for a year.

No small accomplishment for children out trick or treating.
