

Two Die in Crash at Streetsville Road

Action is finally being taken to find a solution to the dangerous No. 7 Highway - Streetsville Rd., corner, two miles east of Norval.

Chinguacousy township Reeve Cyril Clark and township engineer Kenneth Comyns will meet to see what can be done about putting an end to the repetition of serious accidents there.

Two men died at the corner Wednesday night of last week when their car collided with a truck. Dead are Franklin D. Silva Brogas, 25, and Joao Alexander Sovelas, 27, both of Brampton.

Another passenger in their car, Manuel Antonio Garcia 21 also of Brampton, was reported in quite satisfactory condition at Peel Memorial Hospital.

The driver of the truck, James Gillies, of RR 3, Orton was uninjured.

Police say the two vehicles were travelling West on Highway 7 when the truck, which was leading, slowed down to make a left hand turn, onto the Fourth Line.

After the crash a motorist who lives nearby commented: "I drive around this corner every night of the week and I can

guarantee that, at least once a week there's some kind of accident."

The force of the collision turned the truck over and into the ditch on Highway 7. The front of the car was demolished and a tow truck pulled it away connected to the engine, then situated in the front seat.

No-One Injured

According to Ontario Department of Highway officials who are also investigating the incident, there have been "several accidents" at this intersection during the past year, the most recent being a smaller car-van collision little more than a week ago. No one was injured in that accident.

"I hate the corner myself," Reeve Clark commented. He did not think stoplights were the answer.

Chinguacousy Township police maintained that the junction of Highway 7 and the Fourth Line West is "not a bad spot."

A spokesman for the Chinguacousy police blamed the accidents on the fact that "lots of traffic moves through the intersection. It's the main artery into the Streetsville area."

Halton-Peel Shareholders Snap Up Rights Issue

O. E. Manning, president of Halton and Peel Savings and Trust Company announced yesterday the windup of a "very successful" issue of shares.

Halton and Peel offered to shareholders the right to subscribe during November for one new share of capital stock at the price of \$10 for each eight shares held at the end of October.

A total of 99.5 percent of the offered issue was subscribed before the deadline.

Mr. Manning reported that a total of over \$400,000 was received by the company in new shareholder's funds.

Earlier this fall Halton and Peel was successful in another of its projects — that of defeating a takeover bid by a Toronto investment company, Security Capital Corporation.

The Toronto firm, offered to buy up 200,000 shares of Halton and Peel stock on the basis of three class B shares of Security Capital and \$7 for each share of Halton & Peel's stock.

Security Capital president Oscar Rechshtaffen made three separate unsuccessful bids to gain control before finally giving up.

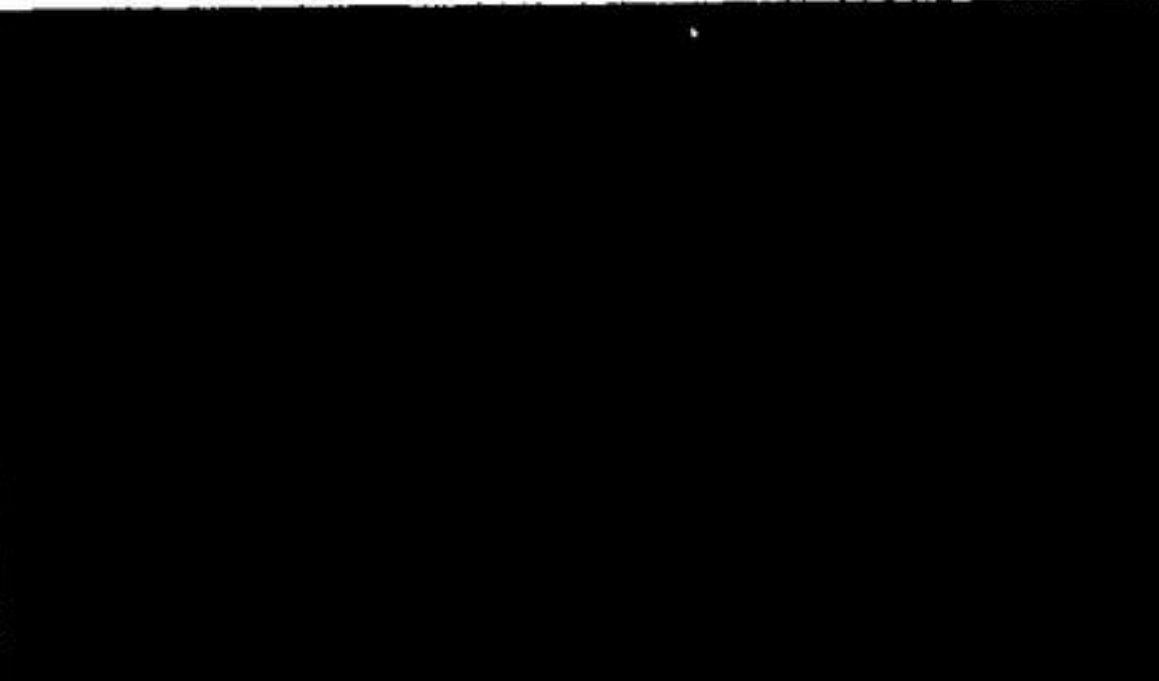
Halton and Peel officials now report that saving and term deposits have grown by over \$7,500,000 in 1967.

Free Phone Calls to Milton Starts Dec. 17

Holiday calls to friends and relatives will be easier and less expensive this year because of a wider local calling area for Bell Telephone subscribers in Georgetown. Commencing December 17, there will be no Long Distance charges on calls to Milton.

This Extended Area Service will increase the number of telephones in the local calling area by 4,850. Previous Extended Area programs have indicated that calls increase six to 10 times with the advent of the new service. To handle the increased traffic, additional switching facilities are being installed in the Milton exchange building at the estimated cost of \$370,000; however there will be no increase in the basic monthly telephone rates in the Georgetown area.

The end play in bridge is sometimes called an "avoidance play." You can end play one opponent so that he will have to give you a trick or you can end play an opponent in order that you won't lose a trick. Here is a hand of the latter type. This hand occurred at the regular Monday evening meeting of the Acton Bridge Club.

The dealer is north and north-south are vulnerable.

NORTH
S-A 10 5 3 2
H-6 3
D-A 9 7
C-Q 8 5

The bidding:
NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST
Pass 3C 3S 4H
4S All Pass

Opening lead — club four.

East has a good non-vulnerable pre-emptive bid. The three club bid really crowded the bidding. East-West did not sacrifice at five hearts since there was a good chance of defeating the four spade contract. However, four spade can and should be made.

Declarer has no choice but to win the opening lead. There appears to be two diamond losers
