Annual Christmas Concert at St. John's United Church

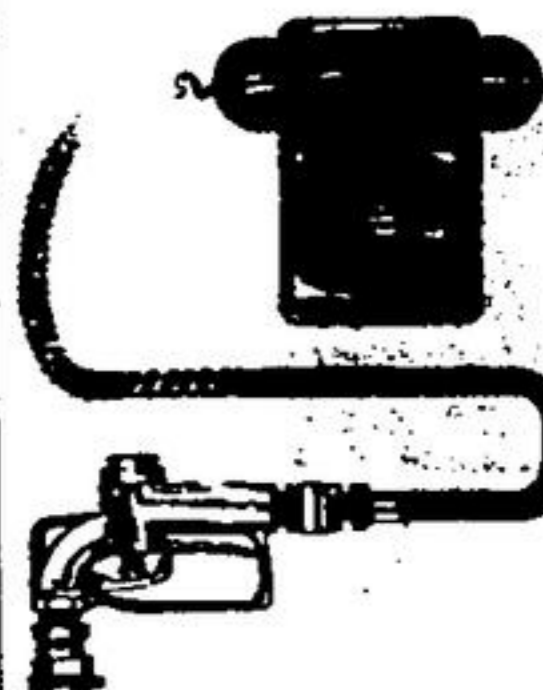

Lumber, Millwork Firms Will Build New Quarters

A major change in one of Georgetown's oldest commercial locations is in the offing.

Beaver Lumber, which has operated on Water Street, since purchasing the Georgetown Lumber Company from the late W. H. Kenner some years ago, is planning a new building on Guelph St. The firm is negotiating for land at the corner of Sinclair Ave. and Guelph St. with the Brumac Company.

Mr. Wagner, representing the firm, told council Tuesday that his firm plans more emphasis on a building supply store and will erect 12,000 feet of floor space if the move materializes. While there will be some lumber warehousing, most of the lumber will be delivered as required from a central storage depot.

He asked, and received, council's endorsement for the move which fulfills requirements of the town's zoning by-law.

At the same meeting, council sold a property in the eastern industrial park to Wilfrid Mino, who operates Mino Millwork on part of the Beaver site. He plans an 8,000 square foot building in his new location.

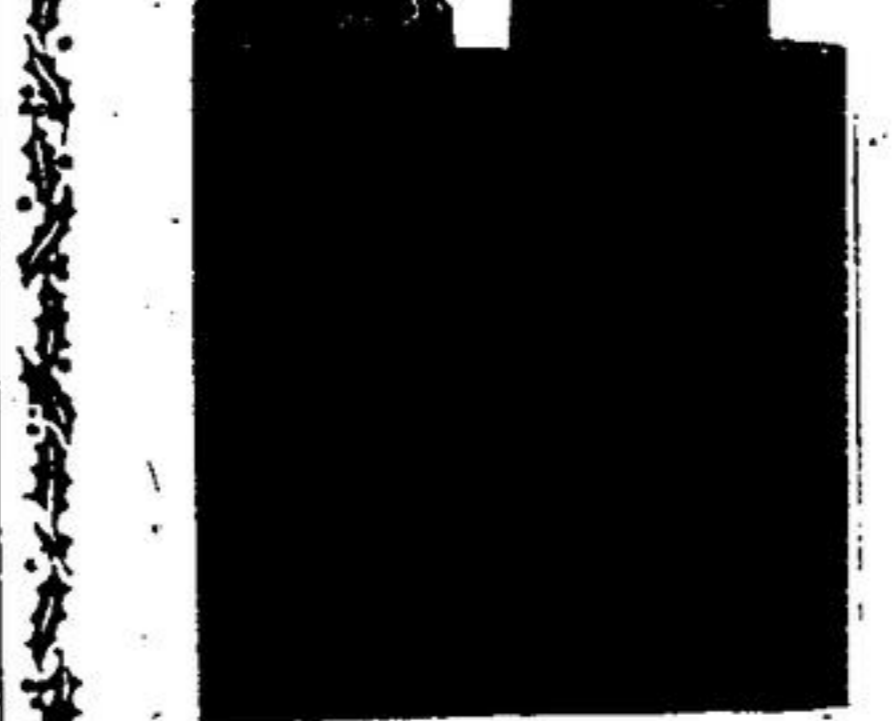

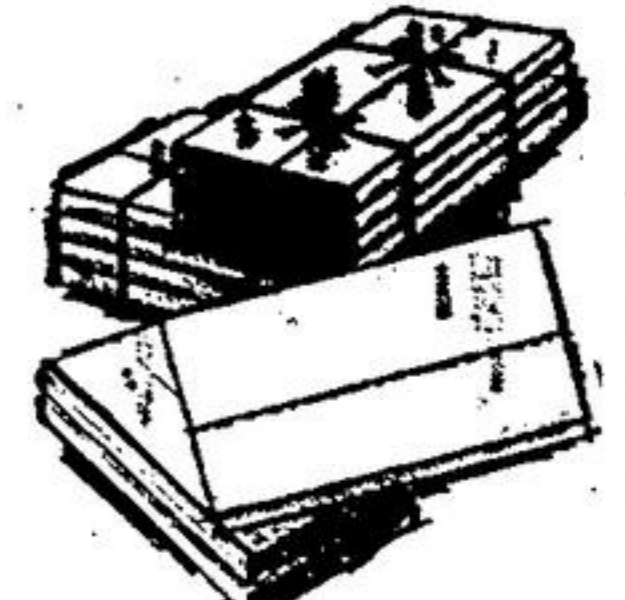
