

Raiders Spill Ajax Creap Up on Lindsay

Sometimes help comes from where you least expect it.

Oakville Blades who have always done a flawless job of concealing their affection for Georgetown Raiders did their perennial tormentors a giant sized favor on the weekend by upsetting Lindsay 4-3. Lindsay currently leads the OHA's Suburban Junior C setup.

Oakville's pre-Christmas package enabled Raiders to gain ground on the pace setters by crashing Ajax down the drain Sunday when they fashioned a 2-1 victory.

All the scoring was done in the first half of the game. Raiders owned a 3-1 lead at the end of the first period. Each team added a second period goal.

One of the reasons Georgetown managed to muffle the Ajax guns was Bob Larmann, a survivor from the Orangeville Greenhorns who made his first appearance in Raiders garb, Sunday. The stocky rearguard played two seasons with Paul Lang before his hydro employers transferred him to Orangeville. He was a bright spot on a lacklustre team and Raider brass were quick to lure him in this direction when the club went under two weeks ago.

The addition of Larmann enabled Gerry Inglis to shift Brad Johnson to a forward line and the move paid off in Raiders' first goal. Johnson scored it at 5:26 from Paul Robinson.

Paul Robinson scored his 24th goal of the season to put Georgetown into a 2-0 lead at 9:25. Jack Kemshead from Ron Lane made it 3-0 five minutes later, but Raiders surrendered a goal with 17 seconds left to leave with a 3-1 edge.

Paul Robinson netted number 25 from Terry Hay at 5:17. Terry Roland steered in the second Ajax goal mid-way through the period.

Fans watched a well-played defensive struggle for the balance of time. Both teams backchecked well but Raiders had an edge here as well.

Newmarket makes their first appearance on Georgetown ice this Sunday.
