Rest Homes as Alternative Studies by Manor Board

An investigation of rest homes for Halton's senior citizens is being launched by the Halton Centennial Manor Board of Management, as an alternative to a completely new manor that is being sought in the south of the county.

Manor superintendent S. A. Allen and Dr. J. W. McCutcheon of Milton, the Manor's physician, are a committee investigating the rest homes idea.

Rest homes are allowed under new legislation as an alternative to old age homes, hospital chronic wards and nursing homes. Provincially subsidized rest homes are similar to senior citizens apartments, but more on the communal style of living whereby the residents partially look after themselves.

Oakville and Burlington Councils have demanded in the past few months that any further additions to the Halton Manor complex in Milton should be held back and the next facilities should be built in the south of the county. Officials of the Manor Board point out the new Martin House was erected with equipment to handle a further 150-bed addition and they prefer the less expensive addition over a complete.

Send 1500 Pounds Clothing to Spanish Indian Mission

Used clothing — 1500 pounds of it in 66 cartons — was dispatched from Georgetown Monday bound for Spanish in northern Ontario where it will be distributed to Indian missions.

The clothing came from the homes of Holy Cross Separate School pupils who collected it last week. A steel bander was made available and a packing bee was held just before the weekend.

The project was originally to collect clothing for Indians in the White River District, but the response was so great and the pile grew so big that Holy

Cross principal Richard Perrotti decided to let the North Ontario Missions headquarters at Spanish decide how and where it should be distributed.

"We hope to repeat the collection next year and maybe put it on a bigger scale by including the whole town," said Mr. Perrotti obviously pleased with the generosity exhibited.

The clothes collection grew

out of an earlier project in which pupils brought their surplus Holloway candy for White River Indians.
