Tighter Restrictions Coming For Treatment of Water Waste

Municipalities and Industries across the Province of Ontario will know more about the tighter restrictions which will be applied to wastewater treatment, according to Ontario Water Resources Commission General Manager David S. Caverly.

The OWRC's Committee on Water Quality Objectives, which already has produced a number of policy guidelines calling for wastewater treatment keyed to the requirements and uses of each receiving watercourse, will produce a second report in 1968 dealing more specifically with the problem. Mr. Caverly told delegates to the recent Ontario Pollution Control Conference in Toronto. He said this report will define the basic water quality objectives applicable to all waters of the Province; the meaning of stringent or more precise objectives and conditions under which these would apply and conditions under which specific effluent constraints would apply.

Water quality objectives have been applied by the OWRC for some time, and it is expected these objectives will undergo little change. However, technical advances in the field of pollution control has made it possible to more accurately predict the effect specific wastewater discharges will have on a

particular body of water, and it is the quality of these discharges that will be affected by the new OWRC policy. "By adopting this new policy, the Commission has drawn attention to the need for improving control over environmental water quality," Mr. Caverly said, adding that OWRC will be imposing specific and, in most cases, more restrictive controls on wastewater quality, particularly where new growth and development occur.



INSTANT WHITE

THREE KINGS
AND *
EPIPHANY

If you were to travel through the rural areas of Austria, you would no doubt wonder about an unusual inscription written in chalk above the doorway of many homes. It goes like this: C + M + B = 1967.

These letters are renewed every year at Epiphany, the only change being replacement of the date of the new year. On January 6th, 1968, the letters will be renewed, with the sole addition of the new year's numeral.

The letters stand for the names of the Three Kings, or the Three Wise Men, or Magi. In case you have forgotten, they are Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. The Three Wise Men are the focal point of the celebration of Epiphany in the Western church, as they are considered the first called upon to worship Christ as God and King.

Tradition holds that January 6 was the date upon which the Wise Men completed their journey to Bethlehem. Yet Epiphany, from the Greek 'revelation of the Lord,' actually celebrates three manifestations of Christ: to the Wise Men, at his baptism 30 years later, and in the wedding feast at Cana.
